HAMILTON, May 24.-(Special.)-The cond annual Marathon road race was held this morning, and about twenty runners, from all parts, toed the starting line at Ancaster. The event was won by Mike Ryan, Irish-American A.C., New York, Cook of Hamilton was second; C.Fletcher, Central Y.M.C.A., Toronto, third, and Dan Sheridan, Irish-Canadian A.C., fourth, The winner holds a challenge cup for one year and a trip to England next summer. His time for the distance—2.49.18 4.5—is an American record, and is better than the time made by Sherring in Greece. Jimmy George, the Beaverton Indian, started well, but got cramps and was never a contender after the third mile.
