WORTH REMEMBERING.—We have been informed by a gentleman who has had practical proof of its success, of a new mode of keeping fruit fresh for the table, as grapes, plums, &c. a long time after they have been gathered. It is simply to alternate them in layers with cotton batting, in clean stone jars, and to place them in a chamber secure from frost. The discovery was accidental. A servant maid in the family of William Morey, Union Village, Washington county, about to visit her friends, secured a quantity of plums in this way, to preserve them till her return. They were found to have kept in excellent condition, long after this fruit had disappeared in the garden. From the hint thus afforded, Mr. Morey, Mr. Holmes, and one or two neighbours, laid down grapes in this manner last fall, and they enjoyed the luxury of fresh, fine flavoured fruit through the winter, until the early part of March.—Buel's Cultivator.
