Memorial Service

The congregation of St. Mary's church, Waterloo street, last night honored the memory of three of its membership, Sergeant Fred Fish, Lance-Corporal George Boone and Private Harold Baker, who up their lives for the great principles for which Great Britain and her allies are fighting. These three make a total of twenty-one from St. Mary's who have died on the field of honor, and whose names appear engraved on the memorial tablet in the church.

The rector, Rev. R. T. McKim, made very fitting remarks on the occasion, extolling the noble and heroic traits which characterized these three young men. He drew a lesson from their lives and interweave, in his touching sermon, a picture of the vast strife in which might be pitted against right.

Lance-Corporal Boone went over with the first contingent and was wounded four times before his death. The other two went overseas with the 26th Battalion.

Features of the service were a solo by Miss Marjorie Lane and The Dead March in Saul, effectively rendered by the organist.

THE GERMAN FLEET


Visitor to Wilhelmshaven Reports Ships go Out Often But Never Venture Very Far

Copenhagen, Aug. 20.—The German fleet according to an informant of The Associated Press, who recently had been at Wilhelmshaven, justifies its name of High Sea Fleet by running out from Wilhelmshaven with considerable regularity, some times two or three times a week. The fleet makes only short trips, however, and never goes very far out to sea.

The High Sea Fleet usually leaves Wilhelmshaven in the evening and is back by early dinner time between eleven o'clock and noon on the following day. On a few occasions it has remained out longer, but only because thick weather set in, making a passage through the German mine fields dangerous and forcing it to remain in the shelter of Heligoland until the weather cleared.

A greater part of the time the battleships and cruisers comprising the fleet are anchored in security behind mine fields and nets and a triple line of pickets protecting the entrance to the base. Once in March the fleet had a considerable period of enforced repose when British mine layers taking advantage of thick weather, sowed the coast-
