Twenty-eight men enrolled in St. John yesterday for service with the 104th Battalion, many of them signing at last night's meeting in the Queen's rink, when Hon. J. A. Murray, Mayor of St. John, and Sgt. Knight were the speakers.

This meeting was the main feature on the day's programme. E. A. Schofield presided and with him on the platform were Mayor Fife, Commissioner J. V. Russell, Colonel E. T. Sturdee, R. B. Emerson, Captain L. P. D. Tilley, E. L. Riving, C. M. Howland, G. P. Fisher, A. Rowan, G. A. Kimball, J. E. Wilson. The band of the 104th was present, and had with the City Cornet Band played the crowds in to the hall. This was well filled with men of the right age mainly for military service and they listened with marked attention. It was not overlooked that the Hon. The report of the credentials committee was presented showing a total enrollment of 231 delegates.

The convention adopted the report of the resolutions committee recommending votes of thanks to all who had aided the conference expressing appreciation of the way in which Sunday school members had responded to the call of king and country, and instructing the secretary to send a message of loyalty to the king.

Expenditures—General secretary, salary and expenses, \$1,828.48; financial secretary, \$70; international pledge, \$125; supplies, \$58.15; postage, \$42.72; Boys' Conference expenses, \$10.15; B. I. Society, rent and secretary's salary, \$146.28; printing, \$180.96; miscellaneous, \$228.42; bank deposit, \$1,651.61; balance on hand, \$72.88; total, \$4,884.80.

The net debt is now about \$180, which the treasurer expects to clear off before the end of the year.

Professor J. M. Trueman of Truro gave an address on "Rural committees and the Sunday school," and Dr. Brown spoke on "Education and evangelism."

The convention closed with the benediction and the national anthem.
