Herzog Suspended

New York, May 5—President John K. Tener, of the National League, announced yesterday that he had suspended Charles Herzog, manager of the Cincinnati Club, for five days for his alter-

ation with Umpire Hart at St. Louis last Saturday. Umpire Hart, who arbitrated on the base during the St. Louis-Cincinnati game, was reprimanded by President Tener for not following the disputed play closely, thus necessitating an appeal to Rigger behind the plate, which caused the latter to become involved in fistfights with Herzog.

Back Lajoie to Hit 300

Even money bets are being made that Larry Lajoie will hit .300 or better this season. Lajoie hit only around .250 last season, but he's a natural .300 hitter. He's near the 40-year mark, but his batting eye has not dimmed. If he stayed in baseball until he was forty-five it would be fairly safe to wager that he would hit .300 for each of the ensuing five years.

Lajoie Slipped Down to 288

Lajoie slipped down to 288 five or six years ago. Then he came along with 299. Most of the "wise ones" at once predicted that the great Frenchman was through, whereupon he clouted for an average around .300 for the next four or five years. Lajoie's slump last year was due not so much to any falling off in batting skill but more to the fact that he was with a club that was torn by internal strife—a club in which the players worked with a "I don't give a damn" spirit. Under Connie Mack and with a real ball club to work with, Lajoie will punch them out for more than 300 in 1915, or will miss our guess.

Benny Kauff Made "The Goat"

New York, May 6—Having turned his back once upon the Brooklyn Federal League Club, Outfielder Benny Kauff declared he cannot be tempted to return to the independent league. "I am through with the Federal League," said Kauff in apparently determined fashion. "I have been made the goat of one of the biggest fustions of baseball, but I was absolutely right and I intend to prove that I was right. I was not under contract to Brooklyn's Federal League club when I signed with the New York Giants. Robert B. W. Ward knows I was not. He repudiated the contract Dick Carroll made with me. Carroll tried to tempt me with a pay check at the rate of \$5,000 a year only after the management of the Tip Top learned I had signed with the Giants.

"I Intend to Move Slowly," Said Kauff

"I have had offers for my services from semi-pro teams in the east. Theoretical agents have been on my trail, too, for they would make capital out of baseball's worst disturbance. Moving picture people have been to see me, too. But I intend to do nothing that would allow these baseba people who are responsible for my present position to sneak out from under."



Hagan Wins \$1,000

San Francisco, Cal., May 8—Walter Hagan, open golf champion of the United States, and entered from the Country Club of Rochester, N. Y., won the open championship of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, which was concluded yesterday on the links of the San Francisco Golf Club. The competition was a seventy-two hole medal play, six being played Saturday and Sunday, yesterday. Hagan's medal score for the 72 holes was 286. He made his first 88 in 140 and the 88 yesterday in 146.

The champion's win was a comparatively easy one, as his score was eight strokes better than that of John Black, professional of the Claremont Country Club, who finished second. As a result of his victory, Hagan takes first prize money of \$1,000.

MARITIME PROVINCES TAKE LEAD IN TOWN PLANNING

(Special Bulletin from the Commission of Conservation.) A town planning act has been passed in Nova Scotia which will revolutionize the methods of developing real estate and controlling building operations in that province. The act is a large extent compulsory and is in advance of anything of the kind in the world.

Under the act a local town planning board must be appointed in every urban and rural municipality, and a town planning controller has to be appointed for the whole province. No street can be created or laid out, nor any subdivision

made unless the plans are approved by this board. Within three years every board must either prepare a town planning scheme or a set of town planning by-laws with the following minimum requirements— (1)—The distance between buildings to be not less than 60 ft. and up to 100 ft. on opposite sides of existing streets, both in respect of new buildings and reconstructed buildings, and to be not less than 80 ft. on new main thoroughfares, whatever the width of the street.

(2)—Land to be reserved for new main thoroughfares not less than 60 ft. in width, and provision made for allowing narrow streets of from 24 ft. to 40 ft. where not required for through traffic.

(3)—The number of dwellings to be limited on each acre, all windows of dwellings to be prescribed for dwellings, factories, stores, etc. Property is not to be deemed to be injuriously affected for purposes of compensation by reason of the following restrictions on its use, if the commissioner of public works is satisfied that they are reasonable for the purpose of securing amenity— (1)—Prescribing spaces about buildings.

(2)—Limiting the number of buildings to be erected on a lot.

(3)—Limiting the height of buildings.

(4)—Prescribing the use or character of buildings, i. e., whether the land shall be used for dwellings, factories, etc. It is an essential part of the act that there shall be co-operation between municipalities and counties and between adjacent municipalities. Ample safeguards are provided to prevent any person erecting buildings or subdividing land so as to contravene a proposed scheme or by-law, while either is being prepared. The local board has power to buy land up to 200 feet in depth on the frontages of new roads. The price of any land to be expropriated must be the market value and an extra allowance is to be made for compulsory purchase. The act has been drawn up in consultation with the Commission of Conservation and the medicine steps will be taken to put it into force in the province.

New Brunswick. Although Nova Scotia has now the longest record of town planning in the world, the city of St. John has appointed a commission to prepare a scheme and steps are being taken to lay out an area of 10,000 acres.
