LONDON, Ont., Aug. 30.—When an automobile in which they were riding overturned, near Hyde Park, five miles west of here yesterday, Fred Chantler, 25, of this city, was instantly killed, and Harold Webb, 27, London, and Miss Lenore Martin, formerly of Sarina, were slightly injured. Webb and Miss Martin are in hospital here. Police state that the car was apparently traveling at a rapid rate when the accident occurred.

The constituencies in which there will be nominations tomorrow are:

QUEBEC—Charlevoix Est, Saguenay, Gaspé, Manicoba—Nelson, Setick, Springfield, Provencher.

"There will be only two pilots on this flight, Lieut. Snoddy and myself," Capt. Berry, when informed of the statements by Fonck, declared that "no Frenchman, no matter how many medals he has, can move here and push me out of this flight. I made the flight possible. I had planned it and had approached the backers before anyone ever dreamed of René Fonck taking part in it."
