BESCO FIGHTS ORDER TO PREVENT SALE

ASSETS OF CO. DROP \$4,500,000 IN LAST 5 YEARS

Evidence Given At Receivership Hearing At Halifax

ISSUE IS FOUGHT

Bondholders' Counsel Says Restraining Order Not Hampering Concern

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 29.—A motion by Stuart Jenks, K. C., associate counsel for the British Empire Steel Corporation requesting dissolution of the restraining order preventing the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co. from disposing of its assets other than in the ordinary course of business, pending determination of the application by the Canadian Trust Company, trustees for the bondholders, for the appointment of a receiver and manager, was the feature of this morning's session of the hearing before Mr. Justice Carvell in the Supreme Court.

C. B. Smith, K. C., appearing on behalf of the trustees for the bondholders, opposed the motion, contending that the company had not been insolvent to any extent since the restraining order had been granted by the court. He maintained that the bondholders should have this measure of security pending disposal of the application by the courts.

JUDGMENT RESERVED. Judgment on this point was reserved, however, Mr. Justice Carvell announcing that he would file a memorandum on the hearing was resumed.

Assets of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company have depreciated to the extent of \$4,500,000 in the last five years, Mr. Smith said in referring to the present financial affairs of the company.

EDITOR OF TRUTH SEES ANNEXATION

Believes Canada Will Join United States Despite Protests of Many

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Discussing Canada's political future, the editor of Truth, the well-known London weekly journal, declares that the Dominion's political history is based on tariffs, so it would seem a question whether urban manufacturing interests are to predominate over the interests of the people of the prairies.

"All the Canadian politicians, newspapers, millionaires and professors affirm that never will Canada join the United States," says Truth. "That is just my, in my opinion, the thing will happen."

Nothing Can Stop Progress of Canada, Declares Darling

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 29.—"They can no more stop this Dominion from becoming a great power in the world than they can dam up the Horseshoe Falls," declared Lord Darling, noted British jurist here last night, in an address to the Ontario Bar Association in which he expressed unbounded optimism in Canada's future. "Anyone who has been to Canada as I have been," he said, "cannot help being convinced that it has a wonderful future. I only wish it had been borne in on everyone as it has been borne in on me. And Canada is not the only Dominion in the Empire. The Empire will develop, there can be no doubt about it.

"Think a hundred years on and what will Canada be like? What will its position? Very different from what it is now, because it has the race that will make Canada what it is bound to be, and nothing can stop it. It is one of the forces of nature."

ACTION WILL MEAN CHANGE IN OLD POLICY

Common Agreement With Other Powers Was Rule

MENACE IS GREAT

Inaction of Other Nations Endangers British Lives and Property

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Premier Baldwin's declaration that every nation should individually protect its own national interests in China without common action, marks a notable departure from former British policy which is given much prominence today.

Hitherto the British have refused to intervene in China without receiving an assurance beforehand of a common agreement with the other powers, notably Japan, the United States and France.

Officials always argued that separate intervention meant the creation of a spirit of hostility towards the British which is most dangerous.

MENACE BECOMES GREAT

This desire for common agreement has long paralysed British action, and has been opposed on the ground that British traders, financiers and other interests in the East would not be served effectively. The menace, however, has become so great and the inaction of other powers has been thrown overboard, resulting in speculation as to what the new policy will bring in the future. It is emphasized that the British are determined to protect their own interests at all costs while still striving for friendly relations with any governing authorities in China.

BODY COMES ASHORE

Spaniard Perishes in Attempt to Swim Channel

BOULOGNE, Sept. 29.—The first tragedy due to ambition to swim the English Channel was recorded here today when the body of a young Spaniard was washed ashore. The body was identified as that of Luis Rodriguez Delara, who is said to have been a member of a prominent Madrid family. Delara started secretly and without an escort in attempt to swim the channel from France to England, a few days ago.

HINTS ENGAGEMENT
