EXPORT OF LUMBER OUT OF NEWCASTLE WORTH \$855,169

Last Year's Shipments to Neighboring Republic Includes Many Articles

LATHS, LONG LUMBER AND PULP HEAVIEST

Value of Smelts Shipped Over Border in 1925 Totalled \$121,224

NEWCASTLE, Feb. 18-The value of shipments from Newcastle and vicinity to the United States during the year 1925 reached a total of nearly two and a half million dollars, according to figures available here today. Of this huge total lumber represents the greatest amount the value of this commodity crossing the border to southern markets, reaching \$855,169.98.

Laths rank second in value at \$686, 802.39, while unbleached pulp sent over the line was valued at \$522,409.93 MANY BLUEBERRIES.

One of the most interesting items o export, and also lucrative, was a total of 405,740 pounds of canned blueberries which were valued at \$37,698.12. The lightest shipments were of tom-cods, the total value reaching only \$33.75. Codfish, however, were exported to the States to the value \$35,057.17.

FISH EGGS ALSO.

It is interesting to note that the United States purchased \$920.00 worth of fish eggs during the year.


