FRANCE AND GERMANY SUFFER BY STORMS OVER WEEK-END

Paris, July 5.—More than 30 persons are dead as a result of floods and storms in France and Germany during the week-end. The death toll from a wreck yesterday of the Havre-Paris express near Achres stood at 18, with 97 injured. The train was derailed by a washout in a terrific thunderstorm.

Non-Stop Flight To Paris From New York Is Planned

Proposed Hop to be Made in August Grew Out of Offer of \$25,000 by a Hotel Manager to Fly as Pilot

CONCORD, N. H., July 5.—New York to Paris in 35 hours on a trans-Atlantic non-stop flight of 3,100 miles, with no special protection from ships at sea, is the sporting proposition to be undertaken by Captain Rene Fonck, French flying ace, and two United States aviation officers some time during the first week in August.
