### U. S. FAILURES LAST WEEK.

(Special wire to McDougall & Cowan) New York, Oct. 8.—Dunn's Review says steady progress being made in recovery of business to a normal plan.

Dunn's reports this week 883 failures in U. S. against 889 last week, and 200 a year ago.

Pennsylvania Railway to cut freight rates on iron ore in near future.

F. W. Woolworth Co. says September increase \$328,333; nine months increase \$2,280,041.

General Motors ends third quarter in excellent fashion. Figures are not yet complete, but business approximated the second quarter. July dumped probably 15 per cent from June, but August and Sept. came back.

### FIND DIAMOND

WORTH \$10,000 Little Rock, Ark., Oct. 10.—The largest diamond mined in Pike county, was found last week, to mining companies announced yesterday. The stone weighed 20.25 carats in the rough and is estimated to be worth \$10,000.

It was one of forty-eight diamonds in 100 loads of material from the mine. The largest previous stone, 18.5 carats was sold in the rough to a New York firm for \$5,500.

Detroit, Oct. 10.—Herman F. Radmacher, a policeman, was charged on Saturday night with having murdered his wife by throwing her into the Detroit river from the Belle Isle bridge on Thursday.

## IMPROVEMENT IN CONDITIONS

Canadian Trade Commissioners Write of Matters in Italy and Belgium.

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Press).—A very marked improvement in conditions in Italy and in Belgium is reported by the respective Canadian trade commissioners, in the forthcoming bulletin of the department of trade and commerce.

In Brussels, writes Trade Commissioner A. S. Blaney, the general commercial and industrial situation shows substantial progress. The metallurgical industry and the cotton trade, as well as the diamond and glass industries, are on the up-grade, and a better tone is noted on the financial exchange.

There is a strong demand, he said, for Canadian canned goods in Belgium, including salmon, pears, apricots and apples, meats and condensed milk; also for fresh apples, honey, cheese, butter, eggs and generally all food products. The tendency is towards higher prices.

W. McI. Clarke, Canadian trade commissioner at Milan, notes as an encouraging feature in the Italian situation an improvement in the public finance with a considerable withdrawal of paper currency. He also refers to a continued heavy tourist traffic, and a bumper wheat crop for this harvest. Italy's imports show a heavy increase in goods bought from Germany during the first four months of the year.

## SAY MARKING IMPRACTICABLE

Manchester Firms are Sending a Letter to Hon. J. B. M. Baxter.

London, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Press).—Manchester firms interested in the Canadian customs regulations effective next year which the name must be marked on all imported goods of the country from which they originate, have drafted a letter to the Canadian minister of customs. In it they declare that the suggestion to mark every three yards of cloth is impracticable, because first, even if goods which would be injured by marking will be admitted without mark, some confusion would arise in deciding which cloth needed marking, secondly, the cost of marking would be considerable and, thirdly, each different style of cloth would necessitate a different style of marking, according to style and make. The letter adds that it would be practicable to place the mark on the bands or wrappers, or face of piece or on tickets.

HE WILL DIRECT. English Orchestra Leader Gets a Temporary Union Card.

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—The controversy between the American Federation of Musicians and Albert De Courville, manager of an English theatrical company which will open at a local theatre tomorrow, has ended by the Musicians' Federation allowing "Chas. Edwards" (Coulter), English orchestra leader, a temporary card in the union, which will permit him to carry out the Canadian tour.

A ballot taken by the Canadian members of the federation has decided in favor of allowing the English player to carry out the Canadian tour with the company, and a permit has accordingly been issued by the international organization.

UNEMPLOYMENT DISTRESSES KING London, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Press).—His Majesty, King George, who had specially requested that no money be spent on decorations for his reception, arrived at Manchester on Saturday to open the new royal exchange.

His Majesty said he was sorely troubled by the present widespread unemployment which caused so much suffering and he hoped that the efforts of his ministers to alleviate the present situation and to prevent future unemployment might be successful.

WORLD FINANCES Views of the President of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce.

London, Oct. 10.—(Canadian Press).—Sir Edward Stockton, president of the Manchester chamber of commerce, speaking on the financial state of the world said he was convinced that the present position had been made much worse by the exaggerated feeling of depression among commercial men. "We are not suffering organic troubles but

our system is temporarily out of gear through abnormal necessities," he said. The suggestion that the government should lift the stocks off the market and finance them for an indefinite period was impracticable and worthless, he said. A much more likely solution would be for the British government to press for the cancellation of the war debts among the Allies.

Snow in Adirondacks. Glens Falls, N. Y., Oct. 10.—The first freezing temperature of the season was reported last night from the Adirondacks and snow was reported to have fallen to a depth of three inches on the mountains near Port Henry.

## FORGERS PLANNED BIG BUSINESS

Arrests in Plot Alleged to Have Forty Millions in View.

Budapest, Oct. 10.—A page of forgers who planned to float \$40,000,000 of counterfeit U. S. currency in the states of Central Europe have been arrested here. They specialized in a twenty dollar bill, several hundred of which had been in circulation.

They are believed to have had accomplices among the Budapest police and to have had agents in Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Roumania. The police believe a large quantity of the forged bank notes were sent to Belgrade and Sofia.
