CAMPAIGN AGAINST BUCKET-SHOPPING IN UNITED STATES

Forty-one New York Stock-brokers Under Indictment Following Failures.

With forty-one New York Stock-brokers under indictment for bucket shopping or grand larceny, following the wholesale business failures of the last few weeks, W. S. Silkworth, president of the Consolidated Stock Exchange, last week offered District Attorney Banton his support in obtaining legislation which would compel brokers to be licensed. Mr. Silkworth urged passage of the Dugan-Betts "blue sky bill" which was advocated by Mr. Banton at a legislative hearing in Albany yesterday and opened by Seymour L. Cromwell, president of the New York Stock Exchange. Officials of the New York Exchange, who appeared before a state Senate Judiciary committee to oppose the bill, asserted that present laws were sufficient to curb bucket shopping if appropriations were made which would enable the authorities to enforce them. Since the grand jury began to return indictments against defunct brokerage concerns, most of the defendants have taken hurried trips to Europe or South America to avoid arrest, according to District Attorney Schrieber. They are probably anxious to stay away in the hope that "things will blow over," he said. Mr. Schrieber asserted that the bench was not out for bucket shop-defendants. The result is that the forty-one men indicted, and that they will be arrested "sooner or later."

THE CATTLE TRADE WILL BE ACTIVE

(Montreal Gazette.) With exchange at the present level, the volume of live stock exports should be much larger in 1922 than in 1921. The reason that so many of our north-west cattle were shipped to the United States last fall was owing to the high rate of American funds then. The premium on American funds then was about fifteen per cent, and the pound sterling was worth about \$4.20, so that the premium on American funds went a long way towards paying the duty on Canadian cattle entering the United States. At the present time the pound sterling is worth \$4.43 and the premium on American funds 1 1/2 per cent, therefore shipments to the United States will be less than last year. There was a very marked advance in prices in that country for cattle. During the fall of 1921, owing to the price of cattle, a great many Canadian farmers did not market their stock, preferring to winter feed. The price of cattle was low, the price of corn the lowest for many years, and there was a good crop of ensilage. In western Canada there was a plentiful supply of hay, and oats have been plentiful. The result is that the number of cattle on feed greater than usual. These cattle should come forward during the months of May and June in greater numbers, and in better condition than for many years. The Canadian farmer realizes that a new price level has been reached, and is now feeling cattle and producing beef to meet the changed conditions. In former years Canada exported about 1250,000 head of cattle annually from the port of Montreal. In 1921 the exports of Canadian cattle were 83,003 head from Canadian ports, and 6,159 from United States ports. Early in the season 1921 steamship companies were slow in providing cattle carrying steamers from Montreal, as it was felt that the business was more or less of a temporary nature. At the opening of navigation, 1921, there were only a few steamers fitted to carry cattle from
