TO SUPPRESS BETTING. Ontario Government Members Asked to Support Measure.

Toronto, April 19.—Another effort is to be made to have the Ottawa government declare race track betting illegal. W. C. Good, president member for Brant, is reported to have a bill ready for presentation which would make the recognized betting of today illegal.

In preparation for the coming fight, pamphlet appeals are being made to government members, stating that the immense sum of \$75,000,000 was wagered last summer at the race tracks, with consequent dislocation of legitimate business and national hardship, and asking the government to support a repressive measure.
