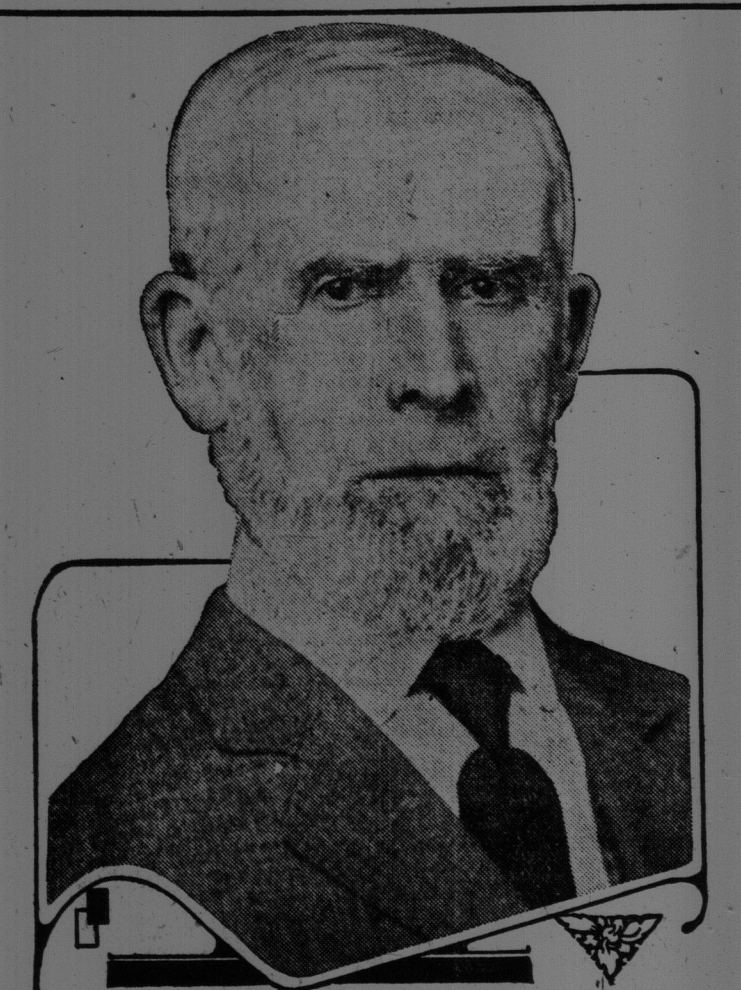


Quaker Minister Is Grateful To Tanlac

CAPT. ADAMS OF HAMPTON KILLED NEAR HALIFAX

Car in Which He and James Terrill, K. C., Were Driving Struck by Maritime Express.

When a Ford sedan in which they were driving collided with the Inland Maritime express 800 feet south of Bedford station, near Halifax, on Saturday evening, Captain James Adams of Hampton, commander of the Western Union cable ship Lord Kelvin, and James Terrill, K. C., of Halifax, were killed instantly. Captain Adams' body was hurled thirty yards from the scene of the accident, and Mr. Terrill's body was found in the demolished car. The two men had been to Commander Atwood's, at Bedford, for dinner, and were returning by the shore road. Captain Adams was a native of Scotland, but for some years had his home at Hampton, where his family lived while he was in the cable service. During the war he rendered valuable service overseas. He leaves a wife, who is spending the winter with her daughter, Mrs. Charles Mullin of Saskatchewan; one son, James, also of Saskatchewan, and one daughter, Marguerite, a school teacher in the high school, St. John, who was at Mr. Terrill's residence in Halifax, when the accident occurred.

Arthur Adams, a school teacher in action during the war, was a son, and a Mrs. Mullin also saw overseas service as a V. A. D.

Captain Adams was a prominent Mason, and his body will be brought to Hampton this afternoon for interment.

Paris, France, Jan. 3.—According to declarations of the Supreme Council of Births, the real danger for France is the low birth rate. This stands at seven to eight per 1,000 while in Germany it is as high as 20 per 1,000. Infant mortality is at present in Germany 10 per cent, of births, while in France it reaches 20 per cent. of births.

CLAIMS AGAINST MEXICO

Mexico City, Jan. 3.—Claims filed with the Mexican Government by foreigners who suffered losses during the revolution, it is announced, total \$111,000,000. Five thousand persons presented claims.

PAYS DEBTS AFTER 24 YEARS

London, Eng., Jan. 3.—John Thomas, a wine and spirit merchant, who went into bankruptcy in 1896, has just finished paying off his \$7,500 in debts and was adjudged free from bankruptcy. He paid 100 cents on the dollar.

INSURANCE IN IRELAND

Some Phases of the Business Under the Disturbed Conditions.

Dublin, Dec. 16.—(Associated Press By Mail)—Insurance companies, mostly English, have done a brisk business in Ireland in issuing policies against loss due to civil commotion.

Everybody has an uneasy feeling that this home is not safe from the quagmire of the conflict between the government and its enemies. Many persons have suffered whom nobody intended to injure. The market for insurance policies, therefore, has been very active.

The ordinary fire and accident policies expressly exclude damage from the results of civil war or disturbances of public order which the new policies are meant to cover. It has been discovered, however, that a clause in many of the new policies might render them valueless and leave a victim who had paid his premium no better off than one who had not.

It is provided that in order to recover a loss the sufferer must be able to show that neither he or any of his servants has been a member of any illegal organization responsible for disturbance. On the face of it this seems reasonable, but there are very many individuals and still more important firms who could not answer for the political affiliations of all the members of their staffs.

Lately some of the most respectable firms in Dublin owned by Unionists and wealthy men unconnected with politics have been raided by the forces of the crown in search of suspected employees

whose private affairs were entirely unknown to their employers. If these employees started rooting out the Sinn Féiners from their staffs the unpopularity thereby provided might easily ruin their business. The facts throw an interesting sidelight on the ordinary conduct of life in Ireland under guerrilla warfare.

Trouble has arisen by the action of the British Commission which since the great war controls sugar supply. It has issued instructions to supply, while the price must not, while the present disturbances continue, supply Irish sugar retailers with any sugar except for cash down, and this order applies even to firms whose solvency is undoubted.

BIG THEFT FROM

MAILS IN STATES

Former Post Office Helper and Wife in Cleveland Are Sought.

Cleveland, Jan. 3.—Mail thefts of \$31,632 in currency and liberty bonds, addressed to the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland, were revealed last night, and post office inspectors are conducting a search for a man who gave the name of Wm. Lacey, and worked in the registry department of the local post office. A woman, said to be his wife, is also desired.

They disappeared in last June and four packages containing the money and bonds were stolen during April, May and June last, when Lacey worked as extra helper at the post office.

U. S. VESSEL IS IN

TROUBLE OFF BREST

London, Jan. 3.—The U. S. steamer Ozaukee is reported in distress 370 miles off Brest in a rough sea, says a despatch to Lloyds from Nantes. She is reported as urgently in need of assistance. Her engines are damaged and she is short of fuel.

The Ozaukee, Capt. Winnett, sailed from New York on Dec. 2 and Charleston on Dec. 8 for Nantes, France. She is a vessel of 2,535 tons net.
