SAYS TOBACCO SMOKING BY WOMEN IS GRAVEST DANDER

London, Eng., Nov. '19—"Tobacco smoking by women is the great danger," says R. P. Moncrieff, a Fellow of the Statistical Society, in the National Tobacco Bill prepared for the Anti-Tobacco and Anti-Narcotic League.

"If the women of the nation become habitual smokers, as they rapidly are doing, what effect will it have on the future generation?"

It is estimated by Mr. Moncrieff that English subjects spent £13,758,100 in 1918 on tobacco and smoking accessories, an increase, mainly due to the heavier tax, of £34,340,000 over the cost in 1917. This sum is about £9 per family of five, sufficient to pay the rent of a cottage in the country.


