## USING SNOW TO "THAW" FROZEN EARS

According to Stefansson, the Arctic explorer, the application of snow to frozen ears, or to any other freezing or frozen part of the body, is absurd, as snow tends to complete rather than prevent freezing. He says this is one of the superstitions that have grown up in warm climates. "The whole secret," he adds, "of dealing with frost bite is to keep your hands warm, and (when weather is severe) to run your hand over your face every few minutes to see if any part of it is frozen. Usually you can also keep yourself well-informed as to the condition of your face by continually wrinkling it and 'making faces' at a spot of skin on your cheek or chin. The size of a 25-cent piece becomes stiff you can always detect it by making a grimace. Then all you have to do is take your warm hand out of your mitten and press it on the frozen part for a moment until the whiteness and stiffness are gone."

## LABOR AND DAYLIGHT SAVING

The curious and illogical opposition of some of the labor unions to the daylight saving plan has not yet been fully explained, remarks the Boston Transcript. It is usually accounted for on the ground that employers are always supposed to be lying in wait to grab a little time away from the worker, and that a taking up of the day's work at the other end of the day, but labor is far too intelligent not to see that if the clock is observed, and the hours of labor are served in exactly the same way under the other arrangement of the dial. And they are also intelligent enough to see the advantage to the worker which must come from the possession of an extra hour for recreation at the other end of the day.

Workmen have had the new system long enough in England and France to know that it is an advantage to them especially. The increased time for recreation is, first a direct benefit. There is also a resulting improvement in health. Dr. Frederick Taylor, president of the Royal College of Physicians, after inquiry has expressed the opinion that the additional hour of daylight has tended to improve health "from the well-known physiological effect of light upon the biological processes." This is not fantastic at all. Everybody knows that day work is better for the health than night work, and night sleep better than day sleep. But that is not all. In England the daylight-saving plan resulted in a great increase in the membership of athletic clubs and indoor games, because there is more opportunity for games. Open air swimming baths are more widely and generally patronized, and gardening has become more common.

In simple fact, concludes the Transcript, the daylight saving plan was made for the advantage of the worker.

## WARNING RE COAL

Montreal, Jan. 23.—Warning that Canada may face a fuel famine in the near future was given by B. F. Haanel, chief of the division of fuels and testing, department of mines, yesterday at the annual convention of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers. He said Canadians are now realizing that Canada is dependent upon the United States for its coal supply, and at the mercy of foreign strikes or industrial disorganization, and he pointed out the possibility of a situation arising which may cause the United States to keep her fuel within her own country. Such an emergency might come before long, he said.

Mr. Haanel expressed the belief that Canada should not be dependent upon the United States for its fuel, as there are large lignite and peat resources in this country which can be developed and converted into satisfactory fuel.

## ORGANIZING NAVY LEAGUE

M. P. Fenner, one of the Montreal harbor commission and honorary secretary-treasurer of the Navy League in Canada, addressed a meeting of the committee of the local branch of the Naval League in the board of trade rooms yesterday. He explained to the committee the constitution of the league. Colonel G. T. Sturdee presided at the meeting. A committee was appointed to arrange for temporary officers and to prepare for the campaign for members.

He showed a signature which that man had given in receiving them and it was signed Thomas Kelly. George H. V. Belyea acted for the defense. His Honor found Kelly guilty and postponed judgment for two days.

The case of Louis McDermid, charged with having liquor in his possession was postponed until next Monday at two o'clock.
