ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST DEFEAT OLD TIME RIVALS LAST NIGHT IN THE SOUTH END

"Tack" Dalton Wins Pitching Engagement from Earl Nelson, 5 to 2.

The inspired leadership of "Tack" Dalton resulted in another victory for the St. John the Baptist team in the South End league last evening when they defeated their old-time rivals, the Royals, in the hardest-fought contest of the season, 5 to 2. For five innings, Dalton and Earl Nelson, the Royals southpaw, engaged in one of the prettiest pitching duels of the year with both hurlers receiving Class 9 support that drew much applause from the 1,800 or more fans present. It was the biggest crowd of the year with the grandstand packed to overflowing and the sidelines jammed five and six tiers deep—so crowded in fact that it has been the plan of the South End league management to enlarge seating accommodation. This could easily be done by extending the grandstand along the first base line.

In the third inning, Cyril Moore, who, if he is not the league's leading hitter is mighty close to the top rung, whaled one over the right field fence. By daring base running, the heavy hitting outfielder stole second and waited little time there but started right for third. Diggs became flustered with the tension of the moment and dropped Nelson's throw. Dalton struck out and Butler reached first on an error but Moore was held at third.

Gaynes then popped one up that looked safe for a Texas Leaguer but "Jimmy" Price managed to reach it with his gloved hand and hung on. He was given a great hand for the play.

For three more innings, Nelson baffled the Saints with his slants and last one but opening the sixth, Callahan singled. Lowe was safe on Harper's error. But Callahan's error was a lifeline for the Royals. Nelson was given new life on a bouncer's choice. Fraser popped out for the second out and then Cyril Moore strode up. Moore's two-base play—a line drive to centre—scored Nelson. Dalton again failed to connect, ending the inning. The Saints made it 2 to 0 in the seventh.

Panthe enthusiasm prevailed in the Royal rosters ranks in the eighth inning when they tied the game. Up to then, they had not secured the semblance of a hit off Dalton's delivery. McAlister drew a free ticket and Tynes popped out but Freddie Diggs came through with a scorching double, scoring McAlister and Tynes. Dalton then tightened up, striking out the next two men.

The Saints came right back in their half and scored three runs before the game was called. The Saints' victory puts them within striking distance of the Trojans, now in second place. The team has been hitting a winning stride since Dalton's arrival. Their batting and fielding is above the average and if they don't fall to pieces completely, they'll get a large share of the pennant swag when it is sliced up at the end of the season.

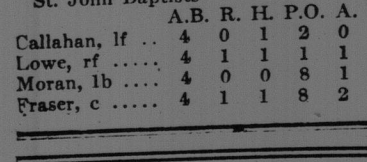

PITTSBURG TEAM GETS AMBITIOUS

Washington Still in First Place in the American League.

New York, June 27.—Pittsburg now steps from the major league chorus to occupy the spotlight which has recently shone on the Tigers, Indians, Senators and Giants. Classed among the logical contenders for the Giant crown, the Pirates, after knocking about in odd corners of the league, have suddenly become ambitious and won ten of the last 14 games. The streak, continued yesterday with a 2 to 1 victory over the Cubs, enabled them to creep within one and one-half games of third place as the Robins lost a 3 to 2 battle to Philadelphia. The Giants increased their lead over the Cubs to 3 and 1/2 games by winning from Boston, 8 to 1. Mueller's triple and a sacrifice fly by Blades gave the Cardinals a 2 to 1 victory in ten innings over the Reds who have lost 11 of their last 14 games.

The world's champions dropped to fourth place in the American League and are only a half game ahead of St. Louis in fifth, as a result of their sixth straight defeat, an 8 to 5 reverse inflicted by Boston, which went into third. Ehmkke allowed 15 hits but was effective in the pinches, twice fanning Ruth when men on bases.

MALCOLM TO COMPETE IN SHOT PUT EVENT AT SUSSEX NEXT TUESDAY

Several Other Local Athletes Have Entered for Dominion Day Meet.

Can "Beef" Malcolm set a new Marltime shot put mark at the Dominion Day sports at Sussex next Tuesday? Few who have seen this boy in action doubt that some of these fine days H. B. Hull's mark of 42 feet is going to go down before one mighty heave by the Trojans' star. It being only a question of time, Malcolm's appearance at every meet from now on is going to add considerable interest to field events. This will be "Beef's" first appearance since his impressive win of the shot put event at Montreal last week at the Canadian Olympic trials where he did 40 feet, 4 inches quite handily. He has been working out several times here with the shot. Although Tuesday's meet is not a championship meet, any records made in competition will stand, according to a ruling by A. W. Corey, president of the M. B. P. of the A. A. U. of Canada.

Malcolm will have competition from two of his teammates, Henry Holmes and "Jack" MacMurray, both promising boys with the shot. Other members of the Trojan track team going along are Frank Campbell, in the sprints, Gordon Wilson, Panjov and Long, in the high jump.

Gordon Wilson and A. Monteth, provincial champion, in the pole vault; "Bub" Wilson in the 880 and mile; Gordon Wilson in the running broad jump; Monteth in the 440 event. Several Y. M. C. A. athletes also are planning on going. It is expected that Colin Thomas, who has been doing great things recently in the 880 and mile events, will compete.

Already, about 60 entries are in hand for the meet and many more to follow. A new feature this year will be the five-mile event which will be run on the track while the high jump is being pulled off. Formerly, this race had its finish only on the track. Officials in charge of the meet believe this year's affair will be one of the best in the history of these Dominion Day meets. The track is in good shape and all that is needed for some good performances is fine weather.

Bruce Winchester, provincial mile champion, will compete under the Trojan colors in the mile event, as will a newcomer, James Smith. Henry Holmes is captain of the Trojans' team and "Bunt" Shaw is manager.
