London, Oct. 18 .- A wave of intense anger, as well as a feeling of horror, has swept over Great Britain as a result of the execution in Brussels of Miss Edith Cavell. an English nurse, daughter of the late Rev. Frederick Cavell, former Vicar of Swardeston, Norfolk. It is certain to come up in Parliament. A despatch to the Daily Mail


