ROAD MAPS SUPPLIED TO MOTORISTS

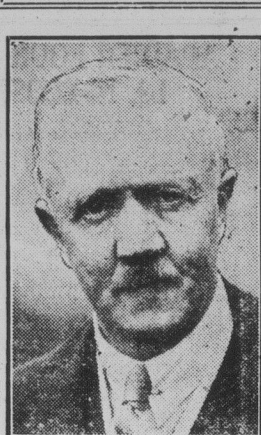

The map illustrated on this page is a small scale sketch of one of four sheets of a Sectional Road Map Series, indicating main highways, that is issued by the Department of the Interior at Ottawa. Here and There

SOME PRODUCTION

Quantity production has returned, at least on a farm at Marysville N.B. According to the Agricultural Department of the Canadian National Railways for Jasper, Alta. The Viscount, who is accompanied by the Viscountess, is to spend a few days at a farm owned by Lewis Titus laid an egg said to weigh in the vicinity of a third of a pound containing three full size yolks and one the size of a pen. The egg measured 8 1/2 inches by 6 1/2 inches. It is stated this is not the first time that this same hen has laid "jumbo" eggs. On several occasions it has laid eggs containing a double yolk. The hen is said to be a cross between a Black Minorca and a Black Jersey Giant but it would seem there must be an ostrich mixup in the pedigree somewhere.

NEWS ITEMS OF NATIONAL SYSTEM

The value of the tourist trade in Canada during the past year is estimated at \$250,776,000. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics remarks that the tourist trade has been relatively less affected than most industries by the prevailing economic situation. Figures prepared by the Tourist and Convention Bureau of the Canadian National Railways show that it has risen from a value of \$83,734,000 in 1929 to \$309,979,000 in 1930. The bulk of the tourist trade is between Canada and the United States. The details of the figures for 1931 show that \$138,193,000 are ascribed to visitors from the United States by automobile; \$50,629,000, by rail and steamer; \$12,018,000, attributable to visitors arriving by ocean vessels. Canadians spent in other countries during 1931 \$76,452,000, \$19,550,000 of this was spent abroad; \$56,902,000 in the United States; leaving Canada in Canada's favor of \$174,244,000. While conditions for the season of 1932 are somewhat problematical Canadian National Railways officials expect that this year's tourist trade will equal last year's in point of numbers. The exchange situation will exercise a certain amount of influence on United States travel in Canada as the American tourist is in the position to obtain greater value for his money than when exchange is normal. In the Maritime Provinces by the sea been in better condition to cater to tourists. There is now within the confines of the three Maritime Provinces hotel accommodation for the deluxe Nova Scotia at Halifax and Canadian National at Charlottetown and summer resorts such as Pictou Lodge at Pictou, N. TREATY OPENS OLD MARKET

Canada's recently arranged treaty with New Zealand, may mean increase production at the motor plants in the Dominion, according to leaders of the industry. Indications are, however, that the motor car business in New Zealand is not at a very high peak so the volume of trade resulting from the treaty may not reach immediately the value attained by exports in 1928. In that year, which was the last year before tariffs were raised against Canadian automobiles, Canada exported to New Zealand nearly six million dollars worth of cars and trucks and Canada. Under normal business conditions in New Zealand, the new treaty with its preference for Canadian automotive vehicles may mean a new market for many hundreds of cars and trucks a month.

NOVA SCOTIA SETS PACE

The province of Nova Scotia set the pace for the rest of the Dominion in automobile retail sales in the first quarter of 1932 in comparison with the first quarter of 1931. While new cars registered for the whole of Eastern Canada showed a decrease, the number of new car registrations in Nova Scotia were reported to be well above last year. This increase is particularly noticeable in some of the passenger car lines, Chevrolet, for instance, having an increase of 25 per cent in the number of cars sold in 1932 as compared with the same period in 1931.

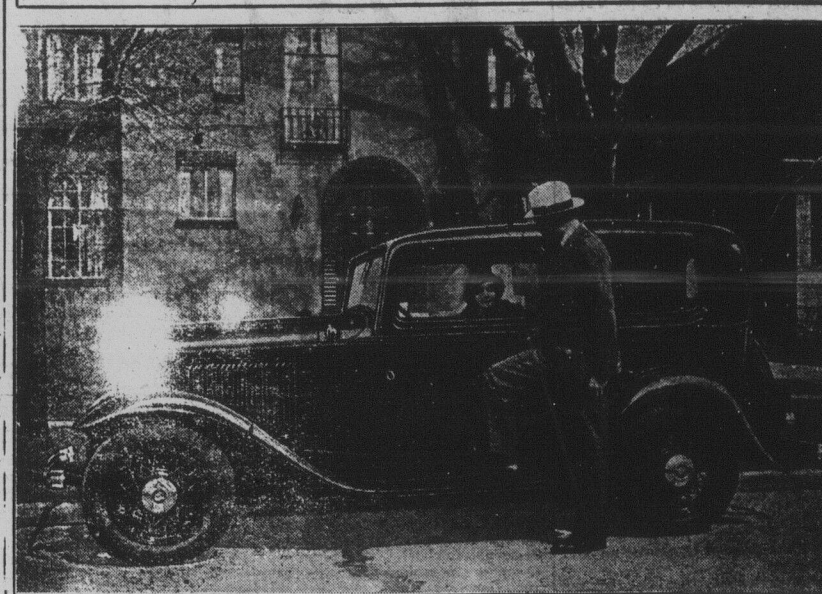

FORD SHOWS NEW V-8 DE LUXE TUDOR



The modern streamlines which characterize the design of the new Ford V-8 motor cars are exemplified in the new Ford V-8 De Luxe Tudor sedan, shown above. The car is long and low, its V-type radiator, slanting windshield and the forward slope

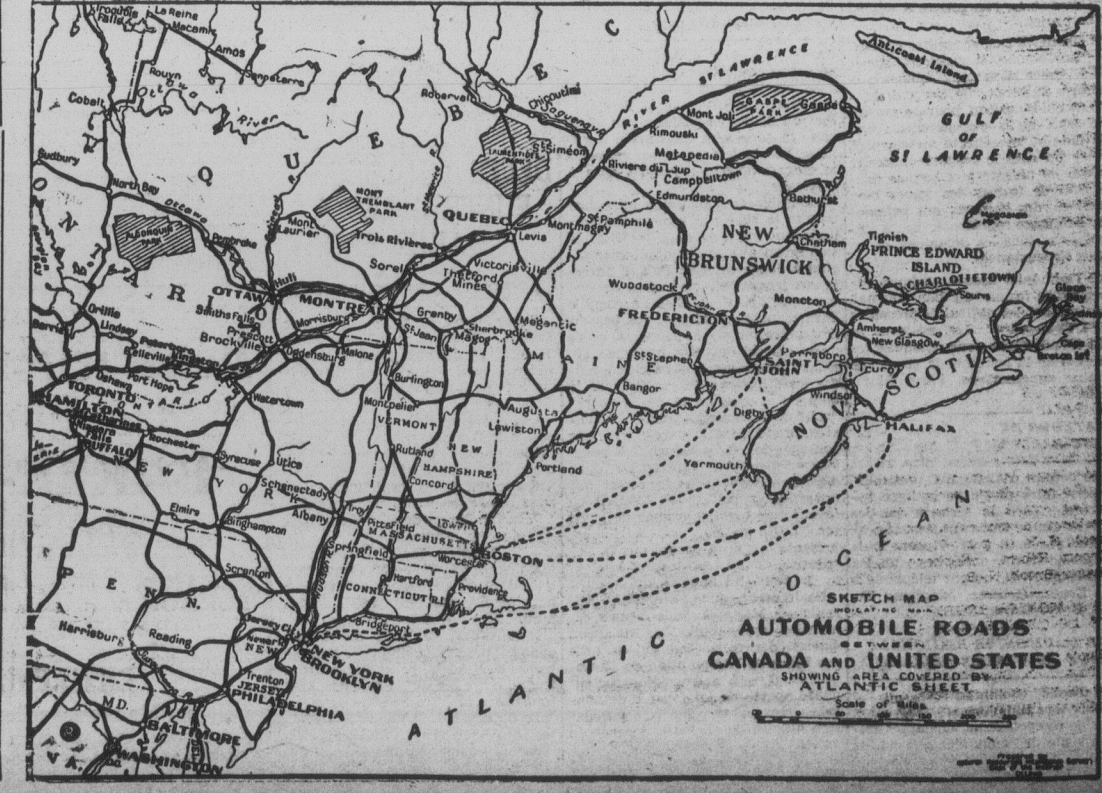
