

Continued from Page One. Technically Robin is insane now. The doctor of common law, signed by Justice Amede, at the request of Dr. Robinson, and on the certification of other physicians, still stands, although the prisoner, against whom Robin was taken refused to receive him.

Jerome's Statement. William Travers Jerome, who has been retained by Robin, made his attitude toward this request plain in a letter to the doctor of common law. "The court is this," he said, "that a physician appointed by the District Attorney in conjunction with one I have suggested, make a physical and mental examination of the patient. If it appears he is sufficiently able to appear in court, he can be brought here to answer to the indictment. He is now a ward of the supreme court. If he is found responsible just what course is wise to pursue is left to subsequent determination. His person is secure. I suggest that an examination first be made and that its result shall determine what is to be done with him. If his condition requires incarceration in some institution for the insane he should be incarcerated immediately."

PALESTINE LAND

Over 3,000 Subscribed At Convention Out Of \$10,000 Pledged From All Canada—Objects Of Zionism.

Toronto, Dec. 29.—A high pitch of enthusiasm was aroused at the closing meeting of the Zionists' Convention, and \$2,065 was subscribed from the audience in a few minutes to pay back to the Palestine Land Purchase Fund. The convention, which is representative of all Canada, adopted a resolution calling for the raising of \$10,000 in Canada during the coming year for the purposes of securing land in Palestine for homeless Jews in any part of the world.

The buying of city lots, we on the Council think, not advisable because we do not want to lose sight of the fact that the object all along in the Zionist movement is not to make the Jews a city dwelling people, living as merchants and business men in cities. Our object has been to get back to the land—to make our people an all-round people, and to remove the reproach that the Jewish people cannot be farmers, cannot be agriculturists. We intend to buy agricultural land. We want to buy farming land.

THE CIVIC WELCOME. The Mayor, Controller Church, Ald. Maguire and Ald. Heyd addressed the Zionists earlier in the afternoon. His Worship said he wished the movement every success. "For they are striving for national success, not for dollars and cents, but they are animated by the spirit of zeal—something that leads them to hope for their people the best that can happen for them."
