NOVA SCOTIA SCHOONER IS ABANDONED AT SEA.

New York, Feb. 4.—The steamer Sinoxia, in port today from Port Limon, brought five distressed seamen, the crew of the Nova Scotia schooner Florence E. E. Gorton, which was abandoned at sea on January 3rd. The schooner was bound from San Marcos for Lunenburg, N. S., with a cargo of salt. Stormy weather, with terrific gales were encountered and the vessel pounded heavily and leaked until the cargo was saturated and she became waterlogged. On the third, the British schooner Successa bore sight took off the crew and landed them at St. Andrews. The British consul sent them home by the Sinoxia.

FORMER ST. JOHN CAPTAIN DIED IN BROOKLYN, N. Y.

Brooklyn, N. Y., Feb. 3.—Following a long and painful illness, from all sorts of inward troubles, from which he passed away here at the home of his son, at No. 346 Hawthorne street, Thursday, James O. Jarvis, an old retired sea captain—who for forty years had followed the sea, in his foreign trade, and who about twenty-five years ago, lost his vessel, Neversink, off St. John, N. B., and escaped on a raft, which was picked up, two days later, by a Norwegian steamer—was laid to rest Sunday in Surrey, Me., where he was born 86 years ago, and expressed a wish before he passed away to be buried all his relatives, Howard B., a son, in whose house he died; Arthur Davidson, Edmund H. and Frank Jarvis, all grandchildren, all of which, and Mrs. C. N. Osgood of Oakland, a great-grandchild, witnessing the interment.
Because of his old age Captain Jarvis was retired about eight years ago, and since that time had made his residence with his son.

ALL HANDS ESCAPED FROM THE SINKING STEAMER.

Gallipoli, Ohio, Feb. 4.—Ramming her bow into Bear Trap pier in the darkness at 2 o'clock this morning, the packet steamer City of Parkersburg sank in deep water in the Ohio River. Fifteen men stricken passengers and members of the crew managed to get to shore and kept from freezing by fires built of driftwood. The last man to leave the cargo, it is feared, will be a total loss.

NORWEGIAN STEAMSHIP ASHORE AT LONG ISLAND.

New York, Feb. 4.—The Norwegian steamship Nicholas Cuneo went ashore early today on Long Beach, part of the hundred-mile stretch of sand which skirts the southeast end of Long Island. The ship, which struck during thick weather, shortly after midnight and was sighted by the Point Lookout life-savers. All hands turned out to go to the rescue of the vessel, which was unable to board her. The life-savers were still standing by at 8 o'clock this morning. The vessel is a freighter. It is believed she carries no passengers. She was bound in from the West Indies with a cargo of sugar.

OWNERS OF RAPPANNOCK AND BRIDGEWATER LIBEL STMR. LEUCRA GOT OFF FOR \$200.

A Rosario despatch of Dec. 21st, says: Steamer Leucra, which grounded at Santa Fe, was got off under contract for \$200. Since steamed Dec. 25 for Havre.

The latest issue of the Canadian Gazette contains the information that a new light will be placed on Chebucto Head, which position is given as lat. N. 44 deg. 30 min. 4 sec., Lon. W. 63 deg. 30 min. 50 sec. A new temporary light will be immediately placed here, and as soon as possible a new permanent light will be placed in position.

STMR. MONTREAL HAD PLEASANT VOYAGE.

But one incident occurred to mark an otherwise pleasant voyage, and that was the death of an infant child from convulsions. The little one was buried at sea. Of the passengers the majority are a healthy lot and with few exceptions are bound for western Canada.

The steamer Bornu from Progresso via Newport News, sailing from the C. P. R. pier Friday, last, arrived in port last evening.

CONSCIENCE MONEY.

Ottawa, Feb. 4.—The postmaster at the department of customs has handed in a letter from Boston containing \$28, which, according to the accompanying letter, represents the difference between the duty collected on a shipment and the amount which should have been collected had not the goods been entered at an undervaluation.
