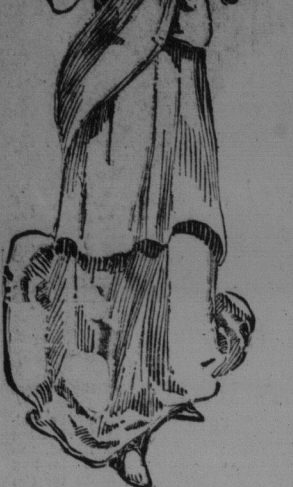


## happenings of the Week
