**HARVESTERS FOR THE WEST**  
 Within another week or two a little army of some forty thousand men will be speeding out to the farms on the prairies to give a hand in garnering and threshing the Western crops. Arab Populace  
 In the Kasbah, the daily market of Algiers, there were to be seen the shadows of a great and terrible storm, despite the fact the French have ruled the Arab lands for nearly a century. The Arabs are desperate in numbers and becoming richer. They fought for the French and the French gave their families a certain number of centimes a day for daily maintenance while the father was in the north fighting. Since there are many 50,000 in the Kasbah families, and each head was used to being supplied on the centimes a day at the father returned home to find the family rich.

Now the Arabs have asked to be left alone, and necessity has compelled the French to grant their request, for it is whispered up and down the windowless walls of the Arab city that a French policeman does not dare penetrate there at night. Even by day it is easy to get lost in the entanglements of the Kasbah; and there are places where no sound is heard save the almost silent shuffling of sandaled Arab feet.

Start of the Umbrella  
 As a shade from the sun the umbrella is of great antiquity. We see it in the scriptures and paintings of Egypt, and Sir Gardiner Wilkinson has engraved a delineation of an Ethiopian princess traveling in her chariot through upper Egypt to Thebes, wherein the car is furnished with a kind of umbrella fixed to a tall staff rising from the centre and in arrangement closely resembling the chaise umbrella of the present day.

The discoveries at Ninevah show that the umbrella or parasol was generally carried over the king in times of peace and in war times. From a limited use of the parasol in Asia and Africa it passed into Greece and Rome as luxury. The umbrella was used in England as a luxurious sunshade early in the seventeenth century, but it was not till the eighteenth century had half elapsed before it had even begun to be used by both sexes.

Movie Sportsmen  
 Movie sportsmen who stalk into the picture carrying fly rods and strings of trout, apparently so freshly caught that their tails still wiggle, are not necessarily lucky fishermen, says Popular Mechanics. Until recently, film directors who needed angling scenes in their pictures were dependent on the notoriously unreliable moods of living fish. But modern efficiency demanded a method more certain and less wasteful of time. A California picture concern therefore engaged a manufacturer of rubber to produce a string of accurately fashioned rubber trout, and an artist-completed the verisimilitude by tinting the elastic fish with oils in nature's colors.
