M. Ferrari possesses no less than eight specimens of the famous "Post Office Maurithus," the rarest stamp in the world, of which only fourteen copies are known to exist. The actual value of this stamp-which has been known to fetch privately the large sum of \$1930, more than 90,000 times its face value-arises from the fact that it bears the words 'Post Other' instead of the regulation "Post Paid." It was found in 1847, and is so very highly prized that not long agos wildly enthutiastic collector advertised that he was willing overcapond, with a view to matrimony, with a larly possessing a copy of "Post Office Me entius," 1847 The 2 penny blue "pert paid" Mauntine fe annther very valuable stamp, and at an auction a copy of it has actually realized \$700the highest price ever puld for a stamp anid in this way. The particular specmen was unit-of, but even a cancelled copy has been sold for \$460.
