Which is proved by the Act of 1788, purposely passed for Canadian Students.

Which is proved to be true, for almost as many individuals have been admitted to practice, within these last two years, and out of that number eight have been admitted since May 1<sup>st</sup> 1820, and Nov 2<sup>d</sup> 1820.

It is unjust for as much as it requires Legislative authority to change the act now in force; and it is also unenjoyable, because the native practitioners regard the European, as is proved by daily experience. It would subject him to great inconvenience and expense, because his funds are expended.
