THE CHILD MIND.

Play and Its Significance-Prof. Murray,

At the recent Presbyterian Summer School at Knox College, Toronto, Prof. Murray of Halifax delivered an address on "Child Mind and Teaching." He pointed out that the human being had certain instincts, but not the special instincts that he required to meet it williged conditions.

human being had certain instincts, but not the special instincts that he requires to meet civilized conditions. The aim of the teacher should be to enlarge the religious knowledge of the child, to utilize his instincts to interest him in religious things. It had been charged against such story writers as Seton-Thompson and Long that in dealing with animals they read too much of the man into their observations. What the teacher must avoid was reading too much of the adult into the child.

Prof. Murray entered into a long discourse with racy illustrations on the play of children. Spencer, he pointed out, had held child's play to be merely imitation of their elders. This was not the whole truth; little girls and little boys sought wholly different amusements; the real definition of play was that it was the expression of instincts. Many of those who had recently attended the General Assembly at Vancouver had visited Chinatown, and at least five different men had pointed out to him that Chinese children play just as Caucasian little ones do. But the customs of Chinese adults were en-

different men had pointed out to him that Chinese children play just as Caucasian little ones do. But the customs of Chinese adults were entirely different from our own. Accepting the traditional view of the various periods in the life of the young, he pointed out that the first period was spent in acquiring sensations, or knowledge of the capabilities of the senses, touch, taste and so on. The second period was spent in competitive sports. Tag, hopscotch and the like were but tests of growing strength. Then, with adolescence of the social faculty. Following up his subject, Prof. Murray showed that the ordinary human being acquired his knowledge of any object or subject, first by a general impression and then by a grasp of the ideals, taking the very apt illustration of how one recognizes a friend approaching from the distance. The general deduction he drew was that the teacher should avoid burdening a child's mind with detail. Knowledge commenced with the vague and ended with the definite. The teacher should pick out the salient features of his theme and appeal to the child through his imagination.

### The Battle of Ticonderoga.

On the 8th of July, 1758, was fought the battle of Ticonderoga, by which a small force of Canadian volunteers, a few Indians and a small number of French soldiers under Montcalm defeated an army of British and American troops for supernumber of French soldiers under Montcalm defeated an army of British and American troops, far superior in numbers and discipline, commanded by Abercrombie. Montcalm, who was born in France, had been in the French service from the time he was fourteen years of age and had served his apprenticeship with the French army in Italy and Germany. In 1750 he was sent to take command of the French troops in Canada. France and England were at war at the time. Soon after his arrival he captured Fort Ontario, at Oswego. With his small army of 3,600 Canadians he had suffered from lack of provisions, but by taking Fort William Henry, at the head of Lake George, he not only caused the garrison of 2,500 men to surrender, but he became possessed of 42 guns and large stores of ammunition and provisions. Word was received that Abercrombie was marching north with an immense army to invade Canada, and Montcalm intrenched himself at Fort Carillon (Ticonderoga) to await his coming. When the two forces met a fierce battle took place, which, however, lasted only four hours. At the end of that time the small Canadian force made the enemy, numbering 15,000, retreat in disorder. numbering 15,000, retreat in disorder

Foolish Fear of the Opal.

Many people to this day have a superstitious dread of wearing opals, be cause they really believe ill luck is at-tached to this beautiful stone. Three centuries ago the opal was an exceed-ingly fashionable gem, and the Italian miths particularly favored its use

for their most exquisite settings.

The opal was at the height of its popularity when the plague broke out in Venice. Some especially observant individual discovered that when a plague dividual discovered that when a plague stricken sufferer was at the point of death the opal, if he wore one, would grow brighter, and after his death it would grow dull. The reason for this appears to have been that the burning appears to have been that the burning fever warmed the stone and that after death the damp and chill of the body dulled it. But many deduced from this a belief that it was the opal that had brought death and misfortune, and with the spread of this superstition the

opal declined in popular favor.

Many persons would on no account whatever even accept one as a gift, much less wear what they foolishly deem the unlucky opal.

Courage of Wild Doss.

The whole tribe of wild dogs, which in closely allied forms are to be found in the wildest jungles and woods of Asia, from the Himalayas to Ceylon and from China to the Taurus—unless the "golden wolves" of the Roman empire are now extinct in the forests of Asia Minor—show an individual and corporate courage which entitles them to a high place among the most dar-ing of wild creatures. The "red dogs," to give them their most characteristic name, are neither large in size nor do they assemble in large packs. Those which have been from time to time measured and described seem to aver-

measured and described seem to average some three feet in length from the nose to the root of the tail.

The pack seldom numbers more than nine or ten, yet there is sufficient evidence that they are willing and able to destroy any creature that inhabits the jungle, except the adult elephant and jungle, except the adult elephant and perhaps the rhinoceros, creatures whose great size and leathery hide make them almost invulnerable to such enemies as dogs.—London Spectator.

A Custom of the Balkans. He or she who enters a house for the first time is supposed in the Balkan countries to bring it good or bad luck for the whole twelvemonth. This belief gives rise to a curious observance. The visitor before crossing the thresh old picks up a stone (token of strength) or a green twig (embiem of health and fruitfulness) and lays it on the hearth. He also brings with him some grains of salt, which he casts into the flames, and then, squatting by the fireside wishes his hosts "a prosperous year, s plentiful crop and many blessings."
