Coroner's Jury Find Mind of Tilbury Banker was Temporarily Unhinged-Father and Mother Present.

WAS WORRIED

(From The Planet Correspondent Tilbury, Dec. 8 .- Coroner Bray, of Chatham, conducted an inquest here yesterday morning into the death of Mr. McNaughton. The jury re-turned the verdict that the deceased had come to his death by suicide, caused by temporary insanity, owing to worry over business matters and possibly other causes. The father and mother of the unfortunate young man arrived on the C. P. R. midnight train last night. Rev. Mr. Dobson will conduct a funeral service this morning, and the remains will be taken this afternoon to his home in Quebec for interment. The accountant from the Merchants' Bank in Windsor, Mr. Drombo, arrived here yesterday to act as man-

The coroner's jury empanelled to enquire into the cause of the death of F. B. McNaughton, met in Tillbury yesterday. Coroner J. L. Bray presided at the inquest. The following verdict, was returned by the jury:

"That from the evidence before us we find that death was due to a wound from a revolver inflicted by himself while laboring under a fit of temporary insanity induced by business worries and possibly other causes."
