miffion, avail himfelf of the power of declaring Martial Law to its fulleft extent, and from the perfuation which the Governor in Chief trufts the Houfe entertain, that in feeking from them their fanction to a partial exercise of it, he can have no other object in view, than the prefervation of the tranquility and welfare of the Province, with the least poffible injury to the public convenience.

On motion of Mr. Irvine, leconded by Mr. Coffin;

ORDERED, That Mr. Irvine have leave to bring in a Bill to provide more effectually for the defence of this Province, and for the fafety and protection of His Majefty's fubjects therein.

He accordingly prefented the faid Bill to the Houfe; and the fame was received and read for the first time.

RESOLVED, That the faid Bill be read a fecond time on Monday next.

A Meffage from His Excellency the Governor in Chief, figned by his Excellency, was prefented by the Honorable Mr. Mure, to Mr. Speaker, which Meffage was read, all the Members being uncovered, and the same is as followeth, videlicel:

The expence of the Militia, and of the ordinary Military Eftablifhments of the Province, having greatly increated, and daily increating in confequence of the unexpected Declaration of War on the part of the United States of America, the neceffity of providing for the additional expenditure to be incurred on account of the Regular Forces lately arrived, and fhortly to be expected, and the impoffibility of procuring money for Government Bills to the extent required, having induced the Governor in Chief to apprehend the want of an adequate fupply of fpecie,
