

PATRIOTIC DEMONSTRATION HELD AT PHILLIPSTON

Last Night—Fine Program and Much Enthusiasm Shown—Able Addresses by Lieut.-Col. W. N. Ponton, Rev. Mr. McLeod and Messrs. C. M. Reid, H. F. Ketcheson, A. R. Walker.

(From Friday's Daily.)
There was a splendid patriotic demonstration at Phillipston last night, which gave ample evidence that the people of that section of Thurlow are to the forefront along with the other communities of the county in giving expression to their loyalty to the Empire and its cause.

The meeting which assumed the form of a concert and speaking program was held in the Foresters' hall which was taxed to its utmost capacity to accommodate all who desired to hear the momentous issue of the hour discussed.

The chair was taken by Mr. J. O. Herby, editor of The Ontario, who, after some brief remarks introduced the speakers of the evening.

The program was opened by the singing of "Rule Britannia" by the audience joining in the chorus. Rev. Mr. Hoffman, pastor of the circuit, followed with prayer.

Misses Hazel and Helen Sillsbury and Mr. Howard Connor, contributed a trio "My Own Canadian Home," which was rendered in a delightful manner, showing a most effective harmonizing of the voices.

Mr. C. M. Reid of the Ritchie Company, Belleville, was the first speaker, and delivered a graphic and most convincing address. Mr. Reid had visited the past summer, several of the countries now at war. He drew a vivid word picture of happy, prosperous Belgium, now devastated and overrun by the German invader. He commented upon the magnificent loyal response being made by the colonies and referred in scathing terms to unpatriotic, un-British and ungentlemanly sentiments expressed by Henri Bourassa, the French-Canadian Nationalist, who after enjoying the protection of Britain's fleet on his journey home from France now turns around and stabs his protectors in the back. Out upon such traitors," said Mr. Reid, and the audience applauded.

Mr. Jos. Gow, a popular vocalist from Plainfield, rendered with excellent expression a variant of Laraine's "O Canada" with words appropriate to the hour.

Mr. H. F. Ketcheson, President of Belleville Board of Trade was the next speaker. Mr. Ketcheson was in Paris with his party when war was declared between Austria and Serbia and he gave a dramatic and vivid recital of the stirring events that he personally witnessed at Paris and a day or two later at Brussels, and then at London when war was declared against Germany. Mr. Ketcheson spoke a timely word about our duty

not only to those at the front but to those at home. We should not "sit tight" and refuse to spend a cent. Those of us who had the means should if anything spend more freely now and keep the wheels of commerce turning.

Miss Mary Moore gave a spirited and most expressive rendition to Robert Burns' great war ode, "Scots Wha Hae," and received an ovation of applause at its conclusion.

Mr. A. H. Walker, of Belleville was the next speaker, and the frequent applause that greeted his splendid patriotic appeal to young Canadians to do their full duty, showed how deep an impression his address had made. Mr. Walker closed by reading Pauline Johnson's wonderful poem: "The Canadian Flag."

Mr. James Phillips rendered a very appropriate solo. After the War is done" and was well received. Mr. Ponton, of London, the young Presbyterian clergyman who is temporarily occupying the charge at Roslin gave a magnificent address in which he earnestly impressed upon his hearers the seriousness and importance of the contest in which the Empire is engaged.

Lieut.-Col. W. N. Ponton, K.C., concluded the speaking program with an address that for eloquence, literary finish and patriotic fervor has seldom been equalled in this section of the province. The hour was late, but there was no evidence of weariness on the part of the audience who followed the stirring appeal with an earnestness of interest right up to the closing word. Col. Ponton during the course of his remarks exhibited a number of interesting relics among them the famous dum-dum bullet that is said to be doing service in the present war.

Col. Ponton referred to the self-sacrificing of already being put forth by Canadians, but emphasized the necessity of continued effort until the war was brought to a victorious conclusion.

A solo by Mr. Rudon Phillips, "Long Live the King" was rendered in the uniform of the Fifteenth regiment and drew forth a vigorous measure of applause from the audience.

The program was brought to a conclusion by the choir singing "Just Before the Battle Mother" a number of the school boys in uniform, at the time occupying the platform.

The usual votes of thanks, cheers for the King, the Army and Navy and the National Anthem ended a most successful program that will long leave its impress upon those who were privileged to be present.

Bounteous refreshments were afterwards served to those who had taken part in the program.

The annual meeting of the "Y" was held at the home of Mrs. Templeton, John street.

delegate to the County Convention at Trenton.

Excellent reports were given of the year's work. The recording secretary reported 49 members, 1 honorary member, 11 business meetings, 6 executive 3 parlor and 5 public meetings. Mrs. Campbell, Supt. of Law Enforcement, was authorized to write to the Post Master General, Ottawa, asking him to exclude intoxicating liquors from mail and parcel post. This law to be enforced by January 1st, 1914. Also to write to Mr. W. B. Northrup and Mr. E. Guss Porter re prison reform and anti cigarette campaign. We received an acknowledgment of this petition from Mr. E. Guss Porter, saying he would give it his careful consideration. Three thousand coupons were sent to the Frances Wilford Home for Girls. The money realized from these coupons helps toward paying the salary of a deaconess at the Union Station, who looks after girls coming into Toronto who have no friends or cannot find their friends. Each coupon is worth 1/2c to the "Y".

Total receipts for the year \$108.61; total expenditure \$104.67, balance \$4.14. Miss R. Templeton reported giving 10 bouquets, 15 plants, 20 pairs of fruit, 48 dozen oranges, 100 tea 11 pounds of candy and 150 garments. Baskets of Christmas cheer were sent to 17 needy families. Miss Farley reported 1 gold medal contest with five contestants, 1 silver medal contest with 6 contestants, and others took part as judges, chairmen, singing, etc also the S. A. band.

The Sewing School at the City Mission had an attendance of 10 girls. The older girls made aprons and the younger ones dressed dolls. At the closing in May prizes were given for the best work.

Anti Narcotic report by Miss Gastrell. During the year the attention of the public was drawn to the subject of Anti Narcotics by several articles in our city newspapers which were contributed by Miss Farley and in March an Anti Narcotic concert was given in the Y.M.C.A. building, a number of children taking part. Press report by Miss Farley—8 reports of meetings, 2 clippings and 16 original articles on "Y" work: Christmas, New Year, Alcohol, Cigarettes, Law Enforcement, Purity and Liquor Traffic. Corresponding Secretary's report—6 letters of greeting, 6 of sympathy, 19 business letters and 19 cards. Two boxes of papers and Magazines were sent to Snug Harbor, Kingston.
