Dominion Day Excursions.

The eleventh anniversary of confederation was observed by the inhabitants of Listowel in all manner of ways and at many different places. The Railways offered such excellent opportunities that an irresistible feeling to go abroad seemed to pervade the community. As early as Saturday many left by train for various objective points, some for a short sojourn at the lakes, and others to visit their friends in city, town and country. The excursion frain to Port Dover on Monday morning bore away with it a large number from this town, some of whom went to Stratford to witness the celebration there; but the greater part took ticket for Port Dover, where the ceoling influence of the lake breeze might be felt as well as the eye indulged by sports and amusements. The other stations along the line also contributed largely to the excursion party, so that the crowd of people taken into Dover by the train was very great. A P. D. & L. H. R. official informs us that the passenger traffic on the 1st eelipsed that of any day previous. This should certainly be very satisfactory to the directors of the road.
