UNIONVILLE FAIR.

The Directors Meet and Revise the Prize List - A Busy Day - The Fall Fair to be Held Sept. 18, 19 & 20. A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Unionville Fair was held at Unionville on Wednesday last, the 6th inst. All the members of the Board were present, except Mr. Barry. The minutes of the meeting held at the close of the annual meeting were read and adopted. The revision of the prize list for 1889 was then proceeded with, and the following changes were made: RULES AND REGULATIONS. Fair to be held on the 18th, 19th, and 20th Sept. RULE 2. Amended by inserting in the second line, after the word person, the words "or firm." RULE 3. A lengthy discussion took place in regard to changing this rule back to read same as in 1887. Messrs. Saunders, Loucks, Marshall, and C. J. Bell, of the Board, and James Lane, D. D. and Wm. Inglis, Commissioner. Messrs. Cole, Dawson and Harvey were the principal speakers, though a considerable number of others were called upon to express their views, and as soon as the disputation had finished Mr. Armstrong, M.P.P. added his support to their representations. It was left for the worthy Mayor of it was left for the Mayor of the town of Unionville to put to the vote of the promoters of the road to Provincial assistance, for it was he who showed how valuable Brockville was to the government, and how much it deserved the loan granted, and one of his gave the Attorney-General, and he added amid the blushes of the minister of public works, would continue to do so. The Attorney-General, who had stood while many others sat, and had only listened to over two hours of Brockville and Palmer Rapids eloquence, complimented the speakers upon the clearness and effectiveness with which they had set forth their views, admitted the great regard he had for Brockville, and upon account of its being the constituency of his able and much respected colleague Mr. Fraser, and suggested that if the government decided in favor of the grant asked, and of course he could not at present, it would give him very great pleasure indeed to be able to announce it to them. He promised that every consideration should be given to the representations of the deputation.

OUR STREETS AND SIDEWALKS.

A Letter on the Subject from Road Overseer George Nash. Editor ATHENS REPORTER: DEAR SIR, - With your permission I will give a few facts regarding the streets and sidewalks of our village. Streets and sidewalks there are over four miles of streets to be kept in repair. During the five years I have had charge of the road work a great deal of road making has been done, including the opening up of Star's street, and a good deal of macadamizing has been done. In 1887 over 200 yards of broken stone were put on the streets in 1888, about 115 yards at \$1.25 per yard. The money paid for the stone has been about \$400. Seventeen culverts have been built or repaired, so that all water courses are now in good condition. Several of the streets are yet too flat, and need to be leveled in the middle, so as to readily shed water. Our two miles of sidewalks, with all their faults, are better than mud. While walking upon them pedestrians should remember that they have been built mainly by the owners of property adjacent, without aid from the statute law commutation fund. Fault-finders, who are numerous, have special reason to remember this fact. Were they to stop their croaking and some walk themselves, they would be doing no more than many of their more enterprising neighbors have done. Last year about 40,000 feet of plank were put down in walks, which, with the cost of laying them, made a total expenditure of \$600 - a very good showing indeed for Farmerville, and a record which Athens will scarcely beat. Many of our townsmen furnished by workmen paid from the commutation fund, while many others put down walks entirely at their own expense. In this connection I might remark that a little persuasion on the part of Commissioner Alguire often results in inducing men to open their purses in the matter of sidewalks. Mr. Alguire set a good example nearly three years ago when he, with some assistance from his brother, laid 250 feet of the best sidewalk in the village at a cost of \$80. This fact gives additional weight to his representations when he is trying to induce others to open their hearts.
