For 25 years Prof. Wilder of Cornell has been making study of human brains. He has mique collection in this form. Toronto citizen's brain will in time be placed among these exhibits, which include the grey matter of many honored men. This donor may know in advance just how his brain will I e

Every university has what a commercial traveler would call "side ires," and this brain collection 'r. Wilder at Ithaca is one of the ost important and peculiar of any of the special works of research engaged in in Institutions of learning. It is a most serious work, although many persons who know Prof. Wild er in a general way regard it as one of his idiosyncracies.

The secrets of the human brain-o any other brain of considerable development, for that matter - have never yet been found out entirely. Psychological experiments have rerealed much as to the operation of he human brain under various emo lons, and the knife of the anatomist has laid bare many of the secrets of its structure, but the full story is yet to be revealed. The comparative study of the brain by anatomists is going on steadily, and as new curves and cavities and fissures and convolutions present themselves the puzzle becomes more involved, although many points are being cleared up

This brain study has absorbed large part of the spare time of Prof. Wilder for twenty-five years. He has important discoverie and has adopted a terminology of his own to a large extent. His unceas ing study has brought him fame in his profession and had added largely to the sum of scientific information His purpose, in a general way, is to establish a standard fissural American brain. He has not yet succeeded, but he keeps at his work, and it is for that reason that he has de voted a large amount of time to in icing persons of various degrees o intelligence to leave their brains to

A lot of fun has been poked a Dr. Wilder because of the methods he fally to secure the brains of educated persons, whose work in life has been well known, thus giving a guide to some extent to the peculiarities of those who made an impression on the world when they were alive.

Dr. Wilder has also made special efforts to secure the brains of what are known as alcoholic persons, so as to study the effect of drink upon the human mind He has a large collection of brains of criminals and that reason that he would like the brains of persons of high intelligence

All brains submitted to him are treated with great respect. Few of them are destroyed. Many incisions are made in some of them, but they are preserved intact and are never mutilated. Some of his prize brains are not even cut. They are preserved most carefully and such study as is made from them is along the line of weight and form of convolutions.
