THE BLOOD FEUD.

British Columbia Indian Had to Kill a Boy For Alleged Witchcraft.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 6.—Descaulh, an Indian of the Tsantele tribe, whose lands lie in Northern British Columbia, has been acquitted of the guilt of a murder which he confessed he committed. Descaulh is the nephew of Naas Dick, who was the lord and master of their house. Dick was taken sick and blamed his grand-nephew Aquanta for bewitching him, confessed, saying: "I have bewitched you and am killing you. Naas Dick died a natural death. Before his demise he charged Descaulh to do away with the boy, who was only 14 years old."

The day of the funeral Descaulh and the two boys disappeared. Witnesses were called in the assizes to show that Descaulh had confessed to throwing the boy through a hole in the ice of the Stricken river. The defense which procured the prisoner's liberty, did not deny the commission of the crime, but showed that, according to Indian custom, Descaulh was unable to be killed if he did not carry out the mandate of the head of the house. Then the jury agreed with the defending counsel that Descaulh might have invented the murder story to square himself with the Indians when really he had taken the youth to another tribe. The prisoner was released.

STRANGE SUICIDE.

Parry Sound, Oct. 6.—The body of William Moore, one of the oldest settlers of Hagerman township, has been found in a small lake, named after himself, a short distance from his residence, at Fairholme. His hands were tied with a piece of rope and a shoe string. It is thought that his suicide was due to an unbalanced mind resulting from his advanced age.

DEATH SENTENCE COMMUTED.

Washington, Oct. 6.—Pte. Frank Miller, Company "L" United States Infantry, was convicted by court-martial at Cebu, P. I., of the charge of criminal assault, and sentenced to be "shot to death with musketry." The case having been submitted to the President for his action, he commuted the sentence to dishonorable discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and confinement at hard labor in a penitentiary for the period of twenty years.

Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, has been designated by the war department as the place of confinement.

MAY NOW GO BACK.

London, Oct. 6.—The Foreign Office has received the following despatch from the British High Commissioner in South Africa, Sir Alfred Milner:—"The refugees will begin to return to the Transvaal Oct. 16, at the rate of about one thousand weekly. It will take at least three months to repatriate those who are waiting in South Africa."
