#### THE BLOOD FEUD.

British Columbia Indian Had to Kill a Boy For Alleged Witchcraft.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 6 .- Desculah, an Indian of the Taantele tribe, whose lands lie in Northern British Columbia, has been acquitted of the guilt of a murder which he confessed he committed. Descultah is the nephew of Naas Dick, who was the lord and master of their house. Dick was taken sick and blamed his grand-nephew Aquanta for bewitching him, confessed, saying: "I have bewitched you and am killing you." Naas Dick died a natural death. Before his demise he charged Descultah to do away with the boy, who was only

The day of the funeral Descultah and the boy disappeared, Witnesses were called in the assizes to show that Descultah had confessed to throwing the boot through a hole in the ice of the Stickeen river. The dethe ice of the Stickeen river. The de-fense which procured the prisoner's liberty, did not deny the commission of the crime, but showed that, acord-ing to Indian custom, Descultah was liable to be killed if he did not carry out the mandate of the head of the house. Then the jury agreed with the defending counsel that Descultah might have invented the murder story to square himself with the Indians when really he had taken the youth to another tribe.
