### FORTHEHOMEWORKER ABSOLUTE Charming and New Effects In Openwork Embroidery.

SOLID STITCHERY AND LACE.

Blending of English Embroidery and Hedebo Work That Is Wonderfully Attractive — Centerpieces Not Much Used Nowadays.

There is a charm about openwork effects in needlework that from the very earliest times has appealed strong-ly to all votaries of the craft.

The revival of English embroidery has been one of the most successful renderings of the fancy for a jour effects at the hands of the embro ess of today. Another is the so called hedebo work, in which drawn thread plays its part in conjunction with more or less solid stitchery and fillings of lace stitch, which may be endlessly varied according to the taste and skill




EMBROIDERY AND DRAWN WORK.

A blending of English embroidery and hedebo work in the most happy manner is exemplified in one of the illustrations, a nightdress sachet of fine white linen, in which sachet of fine white linen, in which part of the design consists of drawn threads buttonholed over and worked with point d'esprit alternating with frillings of lace "cobwebs" and other stitches carried out in white flax thread or D. M. C. cotton. A pleasant variety is given by the introduction of leaf sprays overcast in the usual manner by working English embroiders. ner by working English embroidery. The idea may be developed and adapted in a host of attractive ways and would work out charmingly for linen blouses, ends of sideboard cloths, the turnover of sheets, pillowslips, tea

cloths, and so on.

The other illustration is a lovely example of fine embroidery worked upon a background of linen enriched with drawn thread work. A garland of La France roses exquisitely wrought in file floss silk and shaded with the most delicate colors that needle painting car produce twines itself around a lion of filmy texture, entirely carried out in cut and drawn thread worked with white file floss. The work is so fine that it is evident the strands of

COLLAR AND CUFF SETS.

Fascinating Are the Many Styles of Cravats, Jabots and Rabats That Can Be Made by Fair Fingers-They Require Careful Washing.

A rabat looks like a handkerchief, plain or edged with lace, laid in fine plaits, so that it is sung and narrow where it joins the collar and flares out as the plaits un-fold toward its lower edge. It gives a flat, tailored effect. The jabot gives a cascade effect in lace alone or lace and lawn and is worn with dressy rather than tailored waists.

The smallest lingeric cravats or made ties measure no more than three and a half inches in length and less than two inches in breadth. They are made of fine linen, batiste or lawn, made of fine linen, batiste or lawn, edged with a very narrow scalloped or pointed French val and laid in finest knife plaitings. They are drawn in a very tight knot in the center to give a butterfly effect. They can be fastened on a bit of pasteboard covered with the lawn and attached to the collar with a bit of narrow elastic.
