COMMERCIAL CONGRESS

Overwhelmingly Supports Resolution For Preference.

Enthusiastic Cheers on Announcement of Vote Which Was 107 to 36 In Favor of Reciprocity Arrangement, With 21 Neutral - Canadians Sing "God Save the King"-An "Advisory Imperial Council."

London, July 12.—By an overwhelm London, July 12.—By an overwhelming majority, the Congress of Chambers of Commerce of the Empire yesterday morning adopted the Canadian resolution in favor of preferential trade. The show of hands revealed large individual opinion in favor of closer imperial trade relation. The vote by chambers was: For the resolution, 107; against, 36; neutral, 21. The neutral votes included the important chambers of London, Birmingham, Edinburgh, Melbourne and Sydney.

The result was received with enthusiastic cheers, the Canadians rising to their feet and singing "God Save the King." Eighteen English chambers voted against the resolution; the remainder of the opposition was scattered over divergent parts of the Empire.

Advisory Imperial Council.

Again, on the initiative of Canada, congress, after luncheon, took up the question of an imperial council. The

question of an imperial council, resolution urging the home and cold Governments to appoint such a was moved by R. H. Alexander, couver, seconded by Arthur Bennett Warrington. They argued that it was time to systematize the affairs of the

On the suggestion of F. H. Mathew-son of Montreal, the name was chang-ed to "Advisory Imperial Council." The resolution was adopted, with only

a few dissenters The congress also passed a resolu-tion, introduced by George E. Drum-mond, in behalf of the Montreal Board of Trade, to the effect that the congress "hereby reaffirms the principle of the "tereby reaffirms the principle of the resolution adopted by the last congress, that it is the duty of the self-govern-ing colonies to participate in the coast defence of the Empire."

Wars Due to Colonies.

At a complimentary banquet last night at the National Liberal Club, Lord night at the National Liberal Club, Lord Loreburne, Lord Chancellor, emphati-cally denied that the Liberal party was unfriendly to the colonies. At the same time they should face the fact that all the British wars of the last ninety years the British wars of the last ninety years were due to India and the colonies, says in the case of India, the cost was almost exclusively borne by the United Kingdom. Practically the only danger of collision arose through the contiquity of the colonies to foreign nations.

Presentation to Chamberlain.
At a special meeting of the Tariff Commission yesterday a presentation was made to Mr. Chamberlain, commemorating the 70th anniversary of his birth. In reply Mr. Chamberlain said he had faith in the protectionist pro-paganda, which had been delayed too long. He was not ashamed to change opinions under conviction.



SOURCE OF SHELLAC.

The East India Insects That Produce the Resinous Substance. India is the home of the Coccus lacca, the insects that produce the resin-ous substance known as shellac. The females puncture the twigs of several the bo, the bihar and the butea, and the twigs become incrusted with a hard, nearly transparent, reddish, resinous substance that serves the double pur-

pose of protecting the eggs and finally furnishing food for the young insects. The incrusted twigs are broken from the trees before the young insects escape and are thoroughly dried in the "stick-lac." and from them shellac and a dye analogous to cochineal are pre-

pared. "Seed-lac" is the resinous concretion separated from the twigs, coarsely pounded and triturated with water in a mortar, by which nearly all of the coloring matter is removed.

To prepare shellac the seed-lac is put into oblong cotton cloth bags and warmed over a charcoal fire. When the rosin begins to melt the bags are twisted, and the pure, clear rosin is allowed to flow over fig wood planks or the smooth stems of the banyan tree and cools in the thin plates or shells which constitute shellac.

Pure shellac is very valuable. It is much harder than colophony and is easily soluble in alcohol.
