Verses 9, 10, 11, 12.—What father would disappoint a son's hunger with a stone for bread, a reptile for fish, or the egg of a scorpion for that of a chicken. If a poor sinner would do his best for his son in early prayer, he will find that his Heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to them that give Him.

Down on your knees and accept this divine challenge!
