Sir Richard Cartwright to the Prohibitionists.

Sir Richard Cartwright, Hon. L. H. Davies and Hon. Sidney A. Fisher, were the Ministers who received the delegation of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church last evening, who met them in Mr Laurier's room to tackle the government on the prohibition question.
