600 MEN LOST WITH FORMIDABLE

Night—Admiralty Does Not Accident.

London, Jan. 2-Five hundred and seventy-nine men perished by the sinking of the British battleship Formidable in the English Channel New Year's day, according to latest estimates. Of the crew of 780 men, 201 were saved, a cutter with fifty living aboard reached land since the first casualty list was compiled. Many of the survivors of the Formidabl ewere landed at Brixham, Devon, others at Lyme-Regis, which indicates that the disaster occurred at the western end of the 'English Channel, although the admiralty has not given the locality, nor has it made a definite statement with reference to the real cause.
