POUGHWASSETT, Aug. 27.—Four barques lying at the wharves give a lively appearance to the harbour, and employment to a number of laborers. The barque "Matilda" is ready for sea and her gentlemanly commander, Capt. Behtsky, will carry with him the best wishes of the community. The pleasant entertainments on board of the barque, have been thoroughly enjoyed by old and young.—The dull weather of last week has retarded harvest operations, but the grain yields are looking splendidly and an extra yield is expected.—The new steamer "Mildred" (which is almost ready to work) will prove a great convenience to farmers here, who have been obliged to carry their grain to mills at some distance. The woollen mills driven by the same power, will be ready for dyeing and fulling at an early date.

SHEDDING MATTERS.—Mr. George Pelletier has effected a compromise at 37 1/2 cents on the dollar.—Mr. Milton Anderson lately of Amherst, has opened up a stove and tin shop.—Judge Botsford spent last week trying contested cases in Smith & Barnes. The liabilities of this firm are \$30,000, including about \$10,000 contested claims. They have compromised at 50 cents and made the first payment.—A. Tait, assignee of Smith & Barnes, has demanded an assignment in bankruptcy of Thomas Dowling, mill owner. Debt, \$5,000.—Harper & Webster have a large crowd of operatives at work in their Shoe Factory.—Messrs. U. Keith and Michael Hawley, Point du Chene, arrived on last fall, have re-erected their dwellings and shops.—Dr. Norfolk, of Moncton, has purchased the valuable property of William Stevens, Esq., at the Cape, for \$7,500.—The crops look exceedingly well.—Smith & Barnes, Esq., has made an order. Local and other Matters.

Eighty cargoes of spilling have been shipped this season from River Herbert.

J. T. Smith, Esq., has a vessel of 250 tons register called and ready for planking at Shulee, to be launched in October.

The Shulee mill—one of the most valuable properties in the Maritime Provinces is now solely owned by J. T. Smith, Esq., he having recently purchased Capt. Chapman's interest. He has logs in the pond to cut a million feet of deals, and fall. He is building a wharf at which vessels of 600 tons can lay, and so constructed that access loaded with deals from the tall of his mill can be drifted on the wharf at high water, and there unloaded. Shales is a very safe and popular port.

Cumberland County is becoming agitated on the subject of Municipal Elections and in some districts, a good deal of canvassing is now in progress. In Westchester district locally two or three whirwind of Martin, Halliday, Esq., and Mr. Tho. Ralston, with a good chance for the former; No. 3, Stephen Oxley will probably be unopposed; in Minville, No. 5, a requisition is out in favour of Mr. Herbert, Esq.; in River Philip, No. 4, there is a contest between Grit Candidates and two Conservative ones, the two former being Messrs. I. J. Hingley and Jas. Thompson, and the two latter, R. L. Black and Harding Carter; in No. 7, Pughwash, Jas. A. Elliot, Isaac Brown and Alex. Wilson are the men for the two former being Grits, the latter Conservative; in No. 13, Eph. Howard, Esq., will probably be unopposed and in No. 12, Capt. Charles Smith, Esq., will probably be the same holder off. Other districts have not yet moved definitely.

A political meeting took place at Wentworth on Friday, when Hon. C. J. Toombs and W. T. Pipes, Esq., discussed time, about the issues of the day.

The new Railway dining room, Amherst, is to be opened in a few days. It consists of the main building 50x25, with its terrific railway dining room 24x41. At the upper end is a lunch bar, on the left of which is the office; on the right the wash room. Off the other end is the kitchen 19x15; pantry 6x8.8; family dining room 12x8.3; store room and hallway going out doors and stairway. Upstairs, in the main portion, front are two parlors each 11.9x14.6; back is the stairway and clothes room, also dining room 11.9x14.6. In the wing, front are two bedrooms, and back, separated by hallway 4 feet wide, four bedrooms. The building has a French roof, the gables being finished with neat mouldings, which also ornament the windows. The contractor is Mr. Duncan McKinnon, who appears to have executed the work in a very satisfactory manner.

A Methodist chapel, 30x20, is commenced at Maccan Station.

A Concert takes place at River Herbert Drill Shed on Thursday evening, the 29th inst. The programme is an address; Miss Ellen Read, an accomplished Elocutionist is to read, Miss Hibbard and the Amherst Quartette Club are to sing.

The Late Storm. BRISTOL, Aug. 23.—A violent thunder storm passed over here this morning about 3 o'clock, burning a barn containing about nine tons of hay, for Mr. Woodford Purdy. The lightning struck the gable end of the barn, and soon enveloped the whole in flames. A moving machine, carriage and bull, which were in the barn, were saved. But for the heavy shower, which continued during the fire, Mr. Purdy's loss would have been serious, but no other outbuildings could not have been saved. About twenty-five of the neighbors are at work to-day, drawing and framing timber for him, a new barn will soon be erected. The people of the locality are very neighborly, when misfortune of this kind happen to one of their number.

Schr. "Aloe," of Minville, N. S., before reported sunk at Dipper Harbor, is not badly injured. Messrs. Soman & Co., the owners have chartered the schooner "Templar" to proceed to Dipper Harbor, and take to Boston the cargo of stone on board the "Aloe," and the latter vessel, as soon as discharged, will be refitted.

Schr. "J. P. Blake," from Hopewell for Barbadoes with a cargo of lumber shipped by Messrs. Andre Cushing & Co., was wrecked at the Three Sisters, N. S., and will become a total loss. The cargo was insured in St. John's the vessel was uninsured. The "J. P. Blake" was owned by Mr. Blake, of Parrabro.

Schr. "Melita," bound to St. John, from up the Bay, was wrecked at Spencer's Island on Thursday night. Two seamen—Duff and Davis—were drowned. The "Melita" was 70 tons register, was 12 years old, and was owned by Mr. Norman Allan, of Parrabro.

The schr. "Emma B.," from P. E. Island, for Fugwash, in ballast, was driven ashore at Jackson's Head. The Norwegian barque "Galow," 752 tons, for Hull, which J. S. Hickman, Esq., was leading with deals at Northport, N. S., was moored with both anchors, and one cable parted Monday morning she was driven ashore at the mouth of the Shinimicas, where she lies high and dry, with no prospect of being got off. While dragging ashore the captain had her masts cut away to prevent her from capsizing, and the hull is also damaged. The hands with difficulty got safely to shore. The vessel is owned at London.

Schr. "Advance," Capt. Bunker, St. Peter's, C. B., bound for Wallace, went ashore in the gale of Monday, on Horton's Har. She was driven up to the bank, and was dry at low water. The "Advance" sails from Amherst, and belongs to James Elliot, Esq., of Fugwash.
