POOR SHOWING OF ST. STEPHEN BANK

Blue Outlook for Shareholders—Statement Shows \$600,000 Worth of Doubtless Loans—Some Warm Remarks at Annual Meeting Yesterday.

St. Stephen, N. B., May 16—The annual meeting of the shareholders of the St. Stephen Bank was held in the office of that bank this afternoon at 3 o'clock. In the absence of the president, Frank Todd, who is not well, and is now at a sanitarium in New York, Vice-President John D. Chipman presided.

There was a large number of shareholders, as well as of the directors present. Considerable interest was manifested, and several of the shareholders expressed themselves very freely. One of them said he did not consider President Todd's \$100,000 a gift, but a just due to the bank; another suggested that some of the other officials pay a like sum. In the main the meeting was harmonious and the condition of affairs was allowed to stand. A committee of George J. Clarke, J. E. Gamong, and Henry E. Hill was appointed to co-operate with Curator Kessen in winding up the affairs of the bank. Vice-President Chipman reviewed the situation, details of

which have already appeared, and closed as follows:

"The condition of the bank is found to be such as makes it necessary to wind up its affairs."

NINE SOVEREIGNS AT KING'S FUNERAL

Royal Honors for Roosevelt—Received by King George and Queen Mary—Ex-President also Views the Body of His Majesty.

London, May 16—The feature of the day in London was the arrival of Theodore Roosevelt, who came in from Berlin and will act as special ambassador to represent the United States at the funeral of King Edward VII., which will take place next Friday.

Colonel Roosevelt was received by King George at Marlborough House and later with Mrs. Roosevelt visited Buckingham Palace.

An enormous crowd, mainly composed of provincialists, spent the day patiently watching outside Buckingham Palace and Marlborough House, and the coming and going of royalties and princely visitors.

Another service was held in the throne room of the palace tonight, the last before the removal of the body tomorrow, and all the palace servants were permitted to attend.

Ferdinand of Bulgaria has decided to attend the funeral and will be the ninth king coming to London for that purpose.

Roosevelt, special United States ambassador to the funeral of King Edward, arrived in London this morning, was received by King George at Marlborough House and later visited the throne room in Buckingham Palace, where the body of the late king is privately lying in state.

The Roosevelts had but just returned to Dorchester House when they received a return call from King Haakon, who greeted the special ambassador and his wife as old friends. While luncheon was being served, the Duke of Connaught and Prince Arthur of Connaught called.

Mrs. Roosevelt went to Buckingham Palace again this afternoon and paid a visit to Queen Mary.

Mr. Roosevelt's throat still bothered him. It was examined this afternoon by Dr. St. Claire Thomson, the throat specialist who attended King Edward during his last illness. Dr. Thomson prescribed further treatment for Mr. Roosevelt.

Tonight the Roosevelts dined quietly with Ambassador and Mrs. Reid at Dorchester House.

REPORT OF THE SWINE COMMISSION

The report of the Commission sent last year by the Dominion Government to Europe to study the swine rearing industry has been issued. It consists of a pamphlet of sixty pages of printed matter and a large number of striking illustrations.

The countries visited were England, Scotland, Ireland, Denmark and Holland, Denmark and Ireland, being the strongest competitors of Canada in the British market, received most attention. The report described clearly how the hogs are bred and reared, and the various steps taken to develop the export bacon trade. The far famed co-operative system, as applied by the Danes to the breeding and rearing of the swine, the packing and marketing, is fully described. Co-operative feed buying, which involves the purchase of over six hundred million pounds of grain, oil cake, etc., a year, is fully dealt with.

A valuable feature of the report is the attention given to the methods followed in the different countries for maintaining harmony between packers and farmers, and the securing of a uniform supply of pigs. Co-operation, not only between farmers, but between packers and farmers, is credited with excellent results. This is especially true in England in bacon curing vicinities.

After dealing with the various phases of production in the different countries, a chapter is devoted to the English bacon trade and another to lessons for Canadian farmers and packers. HARRY DANIEL ORR

The funeral of Harry Daniel Orr of Oldtown, Me., son-in-law of Lt. Col. and Mrs. R. L. Maltby of Newcastle, took place on Thursday at Mount Hope Cemetery, Bangor, under the auspices of the Order of Oddfellows. Archdeacon Robinson conducted the services, which were very solemn and impressive and well attended.

Concerning the late Mr. Orr, the following appears in the Oldtown correspondence of the Bangor Daily Commercial of May 10th, the day of his death:

"The many friends of Harry Daniel Orr were shocked to learn of his death, which occurred at his home on Stillwater Avenue, Tuesday forenoon, at the early age of 30 years.

"Mr. Orr had been in ill health for several years, but so determined was he to recover his health that he had been about the city and at his harness store on Main street as late as Saturday night when he went home for the last time. He was taken with a severe attack, and although everything possible was done to relieve him, he passed away as stated above.

"Mr. Orr, who was one of the three sons of Mrs. Emma C. and the late Adelbert L. Orr, was a native of the city and grew up here. He conducted a general trucking business for several years, but about three years ago bought the harness and photographic supply business of N. H. A. Gammon, to which he had given his attention. In August, 1905, he married Miss Marion May of Newcastle, N. B., who is left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband, whose grief is shared by his widowed mother and two brothers, Adelbert F. Orr of this city and W. J. Orr of Bangor, as well as a sister, Mrs. G. H. Perry of this city. The sincere sympathy of the entire community is theirs in their deep sorrow.

"Mr. Orr was an Oddfellow, a member of both lodge and encampment as well as a member of the New England Order of Protection."

EXTRACTS From Reports of A. McGill Chief Analyst of the Inland Revenue Department Ottawa, Canada.

[Bulletin No. 108, February 28, 1910.]

LEMON FLAVORING

I have the honor to present herewith a report upon seventy-five (75) samples, purchased throughout Canada in December last, as Lemon Flavouring Extract.

Lemon Extract is probably more largely used in the household than any other kindred preparation for the flavouring of pastry, etc. It is, of course valued, proportionately to its strength as a flavouring material, and to the quality of the flavour which gives it its name. No legalized standard for Lemon Extracts exists in Canada; and in view of the large consumption of the article, it is of importance that it should be defined and legally recognized.

The results now placed in your hands, together with those published in Bulletin No 114, will suffice to show the character of Lemon Extract as sold in Canada.

The United States standard for Lemon Extracts is as follows: "Lemon Extract is the flavouring extract prepared from oil of Lemon, or from lemon peel, or both, and contains not less than five (5) per cent by volume of oil of lemon."

Of the 75 samples covered by the present report, only 13 contain above 1 per cent of lemon oil.

62 samples contain less than 1 per cent of lemon oil and 60 samples contain less than 0.5 per cent lemon oil.

Below is a tabulated report the extracts being arranged in order of their lemon oil content.
