During the night the unfortunate woman was quiet and resigned and for several hours prayed with the prison chaplain. To the latter she confessed that the sentence passed upon her was a just one, though she said that the evidence upon which she was convict-

ed was false. The British press, even of that section opposed to the government, has shown no alarm whatever over the announcement that president Harrison proposes to recommend to congress that provision be made for a vigorous policy in Behring Sea next season. H. M. S. Magnet left Portsmouth Tuesday for the coast of Galway. The Magnet is loaded with meal and potatoes with a quantity of government stores of all descriptions. This cargo is one of a series sent by the government to relieve the distress of the famishing inhabitants of certain sections of Ireland. Three other British gunboats, the Sea Horse, Beritomarte and Grappler, which have engaged in similar work for some time past, have been ordered to continue this duty for three months longer, when it is hoped there will be no further necessity for rendering assistance along the coast.


