

Underwood Fights For Tariff Bill

Washington, Oct. 9.—Efforts to repeal the five per cent tariff discount provisions on imports in American ships, which has aroused the state and treasury departments, met a set back today with the return to the city of Representative Underwood, chairman of the Ways and Means committee, original champion of the clause.

It is also stated that President Wilson's mind in the premises is still open. Mr. Underwood still emphatically favors the provision, and had no hesitancy in saying: "The tariff is now a law and I am for the bill as it stands."

Mr. Underwood further stated that he believed there was a misconception in the departments regarding the clause and that he believed it would work out advantageously to this country.

Investigator's Report Makes Disclosures. Ottawa, Oct. 13.—Frank Padley has resigned his post as assistant superintendent general of Indian affairs. His resignation has been accepted by the government and Duncan Campbell Scott has been promoted from the position of assistant in the department and superintendent of Indian education, to that of deputy head.

That it would take place and others besides has been freely predicted since the presentation some weeks ago of the interim report of T. R. Ferguson, K. C., the commissioner appointed to investigate the administration of the public domain during the later period of the Laurier administration.

Mr. Padley, who was formerly a Toronto barrister, was one of the early appointees of the Laurier government, entering the service in 1897 in the immigration branch of the department of the interior.

A terrible explosion in Universal Colliery near Cardiff early yesterday has entombed 700 men. The rescuers have brought out 277 alive and six dead.

Premier Borden stated Thursday that while there has been no formal decision by the cabinet, yet he does not expect Parliament to meet before January.

News of the discovery of gold on Boothby River, Dean Channel, has started a rash of miners to the scene of the strike. Says a Vancouver B. C. dispatch.

From Dawson comes word to Vancouver B. C. of the discovery of a new placer Gold Bearing stream, ten miles from Doojak. It is on the Canadian side and is 25 miles long.

Mr. W. S. Fielding, ex-Finance Minister in the Laurier government, has been appointed editor-in-chief of the Daily Telegraph, the new Liberal paper in Montreal.

Police Officer W. W. Heath of Salisbury Mass was shot and killed by one of five men whom he had discovered in the act of robbing the post office. The men escaped, but no money was stolen.

The work of laying the keel plates on the largest fresh water freighter in the world has been commenced at the plant of the Western Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Co., Port Arthur, Ont.

There was a very small attendance at the market yesterday in consequence of the unfavorable weather. There was no outside market at all. Prices of staples were about the same as last quotations.

The Norwegian steamer Bjorn, after throwing over a considerable portion of her cargo of lumber, was floated off the Indian Rocks, and brought to Halifax, where she will go into dry dock for examination and repairs.

The Lordship, Bishop O'Leary, leaves here Friday morning for Boston to attend the American Catholic Missionary Congress which opens there on Sunday next the 19th inst. He will be accompanied by Rev. Pius McDonald.

Several dwellings, three stores, a coal yard, six other buildings and a number of sailing and motor craft were burned at Newburg, Conn., yesterday afternoon. The total loss is \$100,000. The fire broke out from an undischarged pipe.

Nearly a dozen children have died at Billingham, Washington within a few days from a mysterious malady, and a number of others are not expected to recover. Dr. Eugene Kelly, State health commissioner, said in a warning issued today that the disease resembled cholera, but its cause introduced into this country by rats.

News comes from Fairfield Maine of the death by drowning of Mr. Michael McDonald, formerly of Charlottetown, in this Province. Deceased was 32 years of age and had been a resident of Fairfield for fourteen years. He leaves, to mourn, a wife and a family of small children, besides a mother two sisters and three brothers.

The portrait of the late Dr. F. E. Kelly, who had been Mayor of Charlottetown, has been added to the palace of some former chief Magistrate, adorning the walls of the Council chamber. The painting, which is a work of art, has been presented to the city Government by Mrs. Kelly and it constitutes a valuable addition to the painted portraits in the Council chamber.

His Lordship, Bishop O'Leary, accompanied by Rev. Pius McDonald, went to Kinkora on Saturday where he administered the Sacrament of Confirmation on Sunday to over one hundred candidates. On Monday his Lordship, accompanied by Rev. J. J. McDonald, P. P., and Rev. Pius McDonald visited the church at Seven Mile Bay where he confirmed over one hundred candidates. He was accorded a royal welcome by the parishioners and presented with an address of welcome. His Lordship made most appropriate responses to the address. The Bishop and Father Pius returned to the city Monday evening.

Mr. Edgan Walker, son of Angus Walker of this city, met with a serious accident at the Railway shops here on Friday last. He was employed in Mr. M. F. Hogan's mill, and went down to the railway shops on some business. He accidentally fell into a vat of boiling potash and acid, used for cleaning metals, and was badly scalded up to both knees. The place was filled with smoke and he did not notice the uncorrected tank. He was removed as quickly as possible and first aid was promptly rendered. Medical attendance was then summoned and he was taken to his home where he is doing as well as could be expected.

Cape Breton Men Released Raid Bounty.

Sydney, Oct. 12.—The Frontier Raid bounty commission which has been sitting in this county for the past few days have completed their investigations into the status of the Cape Breton regiments which were in active service following the proclamation of 1867. The members of regiments then in service were found eligible to receive the bounty. Already 720 applications are before the commission from this section of the county and it is expected the total will run up to 1,000, making a total bounty payable in Cape Breton of \$100,000. The individual applicants are being examined by the commission and all approved by them will be forwarded to Ottawa for final action.

Many of those who served in the regiments of that time are objecting to taking the bounty on the grounds that it is a cheap way to reward their loyalty. One man told the commission, "I need the money, but I don't want it, I went out for my crown and country and am not asking to be paid for it." Many who served intend taking the bounty, and giving it toward charitable objects.
