RECIPROCITY WITH CANADA.—Washington, Feb. 14.—A Bill was introduced in the House to-day by Mr. Battersworth, of Ohio, to provide for reciprocity between the United States and the Dominion of Canada. It provides that the Government of Canada will permit all articles of trade and commerce to enter ports of Canada free of duty, then all products of Canada of every description shall be permitted to enter ports of the United States free of duty, it being the intention to provide for absolute reciprocity of trade between the two countries as to all articles of what ever name or nature produced therein.

Reciprocity with the United States means a big boom for Goderich.
