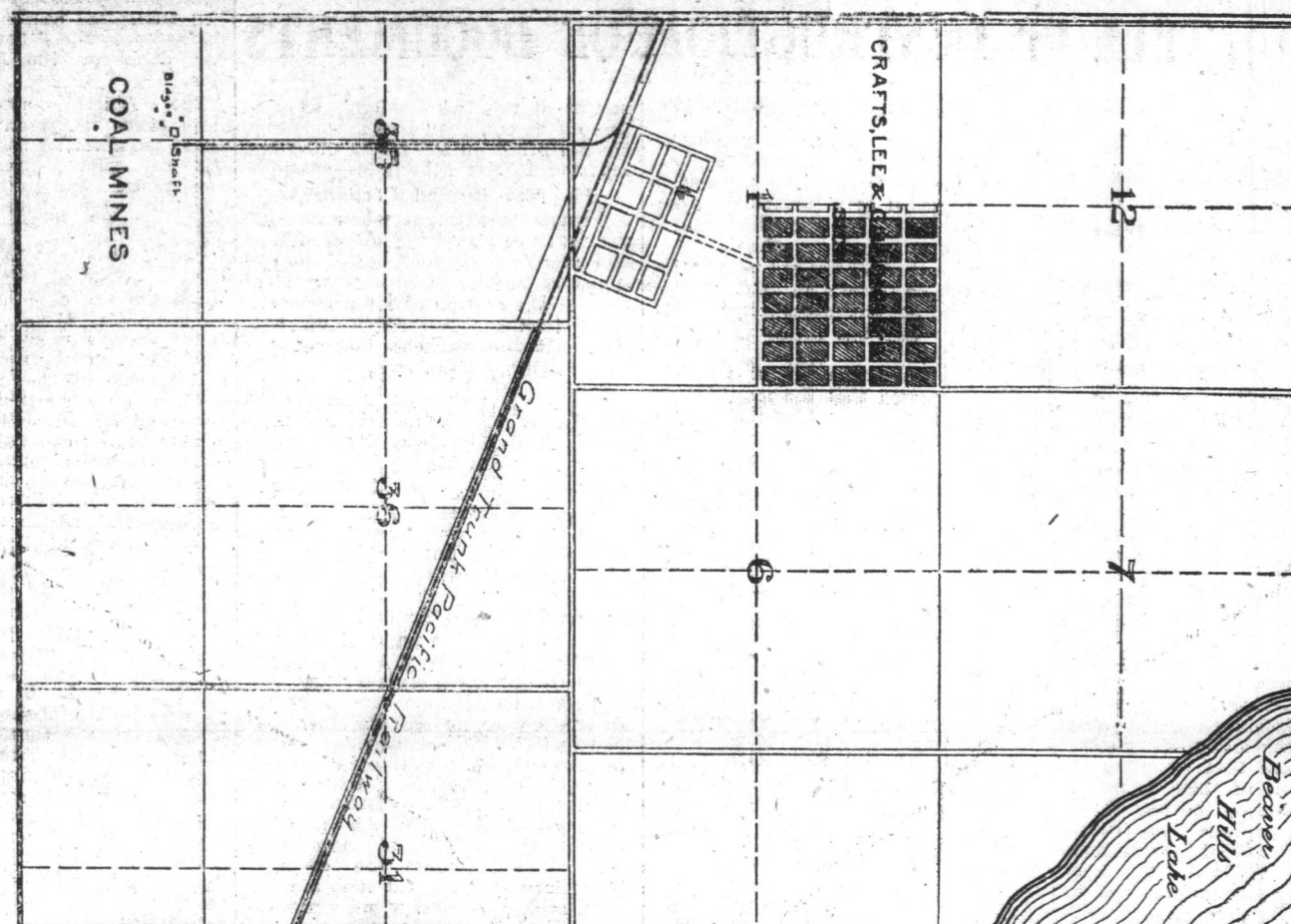

Winnipeg, Sept. 9.—The wheat markets are to-day lacking strength, exhibited recent world's shipment for the month much larger than expected amount on ocean passage nearly three million bushels. Pool closed  $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ to  $\frac{1}{4}$ ¢ lower on markets were strong on turns, but closed at the close of the day  $\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ to  $\frac{1}{4}$ ¢ lower.
