BERLIN, June 11. Germany's aggressive attitude in connection with the Moroccan situation is manifested in a plainly worded official announcement in the North German Gazette, that the Empire would consider itself released from the obligations of the Algeciras agreement, and would assume full liberty of action in case of the occupation of Fez by the French. This pronouncement has been received with great coldness in two unexpected quarters, Austro-Hungary and Russia, both nations having given unmistakable intimations that they will not countenance any attempts to embarrass France in her present activity. The attitude of Austria is particularly unwelcome and surprising, because of the supposed indebtedness of Austria for German support in the Bosman crisis.
