New York, Jan. 20 .- Speaking to a oig audience, among whom were many society women, in the Brooklyn Academy of Music, Rev. Bernard Vaughan, the noted English Jesuit reacher, expressed strong views ances as the "Apache" and the Turkey Trot." As usual, the eminent speaker adhered to his custom of calling a spade a spade.

"If proper dancing is all the world over a recognized and exhilarating pastime-improper dancing, on the contrary, is a practice that is intoxicating and therefore to be ostracised from every decent vaudeville, and, still more, from every private drawing room," he said.

"Honiton, November 7, 1787 .- Yesterday morning three Excise officers. who, on information that a party of smugglers would return from the sea coast loaded with spirits, by way of Roncombe's Gulf Turnpike Gate, lay in wait for them near that place. The body of smugglers, six in number, with a horse each, laden with spirits, had, very artfully, sent two of their party, Easy and Marsh, on before, who, on being attacked by the Excise men, very readilly delivered them their goods, upon which the Excise men told them they would give them their horses, and bid-them begone; but, as that would not answer their end, therefore, to cover their design of waiting until their comrades came forward to their assistance, they beg-

ged the Excise men to let them drink.

"While the officers were making preparations for that purpose, the other four smugglers rode up, when a most furious and bloody engagearmed, stood their ground for some time, particularly Mr. Jenkins, of Honiton, and Mr. Scott, from Ottery Division. These two, having been knocked down by large stones thrown by the smugglers, were overpowered by their numbers, who, taking their cutlasses from them, exercised them with more than savage barbarity. whilst those who had not those weapons made use of large stones, until they left their mangled carcases most horrible objects to behold. Mr. is supposed; the other, Mr. Scott, languished a few hours under a furze rick, near the turnpike house, after which, being seen by some people coming to Honiton market, he was removed to the house, where he ex-
