"Since Newfoundland in 1869 refused to become a component part of the Dominion of Canada, many efforts have been made to induce the island to reconsider its decision. In 1867 under an act of the imperial parliament, passed March 9 and taking effect on July 1-since regarded and observed as a red-letter date in Canadian history-Ontario and Quebec (organized as provinces) and Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were federally united in one Dominion. The legislature of Newfoundland declared in favor of joining the Dominion, but, in November, 1869, the people voted overwhelmilgly against it. Sir John MacDonald, then premier, was greatly disappointed, although he did not question the right of the island to decide for itself. In the nearly half a century that has elapsed since the establishment of the Dominion, Canadians have never abandoned the

"Proposals looking to the accomdishment of union between Newfoundland and the Dominion were unsuccessfully made in 1888, in 1892 and again in 1895. The latter attempt at irst promised to bear fruit, but this ime the difficulties were raised on the side of the Dominion. In order to bring about the connection it would

New York, Sept. 8 .- Zador Szabalos, editor of the Elore, a Hungarian daily newspaper, published at No. 5 East Third Street, which champions the cause of labor, yesterday gave out the following statement:

"As a labor newspaper our attitude oward the Austro-Hungarian Ambassador's strike-fomenting schemes is naturally directed by two considerations. It is one question whether the Austrian and Hungarian workers employed by the ammunition factories have a right to strike for improving their working conditions, and anothe question whether the Austro-Hungar ian Ambassador has a right to influence the workers' movement. We answer the first question by a most em phatic 'yes.'

"On the other hand, we denound most expressly the Ambassador's attempt to interfere with the workers' movement, which has been heretofore, and will and must be hereafter, purely

We fully agree with the American standpoint that a representative of a foreign country commits an inexcusable indiscretion by attempting to interfere with the other State's domestic affairs.

"For the second, and this is our chief consideration, we absolutely repudiate the Ambassador's approaches toward the working class movement. The plain fact that it is only now that he discovers that Austrians and Hungarians are toiling twelve hours a day and that this same circumstance did not disturb his soft dreams for years, explains everything.

"We deplore the Austrian-Hungarian. Ambassador's blunder all the more as it is apt to reflect a false light on future labor movements in munition factories."
