

Poverty, Prosperty and Prices.

So far as this country is concerned the primary cause of high prices is not the activity of German submarines, nor the shortage of shipping, nor the failure of harvests, but the unexampled prosperity of the masses of our population. This increased prosperity means an increased purchasing power and the exercise of that power by the mass of the people drives prices upwards. It is not only food that is affected. Drapers, milliners, jewellers, and all caterers for the comforts or the luxuries of the mass of the community, have with rare exceptions been doing better business at

Incidentally, a raising of the price, while bringing justice to the poor, would have brought revenue to the State, for the Government owns all the sugar im-
