## AMENDMENT REJECTED.

LONDON, Jan. 17. The Commons by vote of 136 to 48 to-day rejected an amendment to the cars and from yards that blocked the man-power bill which proposed to apply conscription to Ireland.

WILL NOT RECOGNIZE LENINE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. A conference of diplomats in Petrograd with Premier Lenine regarding the arrest of the Roumanian Minister will not be construed by the U. S. Government as a recognition of a de facto character of the Bolsheviki Government. It was made clear at the State Department to-day that while there exists no question as to the de facto character in Petrograd there is no assurance of its ability to control a large part of the country, and until the exercise of much wider influence is displayed, there probably would be no recognition even as a de facto government.

THE BOLSHEVIKI. STOCKHOLM, Jan. 17. The Lokal Ukranian Information Bureau announces that it is in possession of information showing that the Russian-Bolsheviki troops are tearing up railways and destroying in order to capture or disperse the Ukranian troops coming northward. The Bureau says the Bolshevik troops repeatedly have lured Ukranian units into traps near Minek, disarmed them and committed various deeds of violence, and then sent them north as prisoners. The announc ment adds that great numbers of Ger man prisoners are returning from Si beria and that the Ukranians are taking their places.
