## To-Day's Messages.

WANTS WORLD WIDE FIGHT.

LONDON, March 10. The Kronstadt Government issued a proclamation to the workers of the world to begin a fight against Communism, according to a Helmsforsger despatch. Reports from Petrograd say Soviet officials are ready to leave at any moment, and that War Minister Trotsky has ordered the arrest of the Estonian Legation.

### DOWN ON SIMONS.

BERLIN, March 10. The German Government is issuing a white book on the London Conference, pan-German and moderate newspapers concur in the statement that Dr. Simons' latest offer to the Allies was unauthorized, and declare he will be obliged to resign as Foreign Secretary.

### U.S. CONSULAR REPORT.

WASHINGTON, March 10. Continued business depression in Europe, with the exception of Italy, is reported by United States Consuls in their monthly survey of world economic conditions, issued yesterday, by the Department of Commerce. Signs of improvement were seen in the Far East, but there was little change in South American countries. Both exports and imports into Great Britain are decreasing, contributing to unemployment.

### OFFICIAL ASSASSINATED.

EL PASO, Texas, March 10. Col. Angel Maxilo, Chief Clerk in the Department of Interior of Mexico, Chief of Staff under former Provisional President Dela Huerta, was assassinated in Mexico City on Monday, according to a despatch.

### REPUBLICANS THREATEN SOLDIERS.

DUBLIN, March 10. Notice establishing a Curfew for Crown forces, and announcing that any soldier seen on the streets after ten o'clock at night, was liable to be shot, were posted here yesterday. The notices were signed "Irish Republican Army."

## Horse Races Yesterday.

A series of interesting races between the city cabmen were run off on Quidi Vidi Lake yesterday afternoon. Cabman Wylie's horse coming first in 3 out of 5 heats. Cabmen's Kean and Brown tied for second place and in the finals Kean's horse won. There was also some exhibition racing between Howard Mann, Sweet Echo, Finnister and Bert Axworthy. Sweet Echo did not show the speed exhibited at the Horsemen's meet last Wednesday afternoon. Bert Axworthy, the Model Farm horse, showed great speed for short spurts. The driver not entering him in the race until the other horses were half up the course. Competent judges say he has no staying power, this opinion being confirmed by the fact that after two short heats the animal bled from the nose. The cabmen wish to thank Messrs. Perkins, Vasey, Duder, Duff and Salter, who acted as judges and starters.

Howard shared her hilarious spirit, while the Axworthy horse was on dress parade and strutted about like a peacock. ## Police Court.

Drunk and Disorderly.—A man was charged with being drunk and disorderly. He resisted arrest and used obscene language. He was fined \$1 and costs.

Larceny Case.—A man was charged with the larceny of some harness. The case was postponed until Saturday.

Receiving Stolen Goods.—A man charged with receiving a horse's bridle which he knew to be stolen was allowed to go until Saturday, the Inspector General having asked for a postponement.

Rum and Rabbits.—The case arising out of the famous "rum and rabbits" story which was published in the Telegram some time ago, came up for hearing to-day, when a man was charged with a breach of the Prohibition Act. Mr. H. A. Winter appeared for the prosecution and Mr. C. E. Hunt for the defendant. Thomas Lee, conductor on the Placentia train, examined by Mr. Winter, produced a shipping bill for a barrel of rabbits consigned from Ville Marie to New Harbor by the accused. The latter was on the same train as the barrel and when Whitehouse was reached and he went to look for his property he discovered that it was missing. Witness then wired the R.N. Co's Superintendent. Cross examined by Mr. Hunt, witness said the box car was not opened between Ville Marie and Whitehouse. Nevertheless, the seal on the door towards the engine which was intact at Ville Marie was found at Whitehouse to be broken. Mr. D. James Davies, Government Analyst, submitted details of his analysis of some rum submitted to him for that purpose Raymond Whelan, a brakeman on the Placentia train, said that he saw the barrel and having suspicions concerning its contents broke it open but found nothing but sawdust. He was cross examined by Mr. Hunt. Albert J. Ryan, the Station Agent at Placentia, said he had received instructions to search the tender of the train for concealed packages. The engine driver told him that that was unnecessary as he had removed a keg of rum from the coal in the tender. Witness had the keg brought to his office, and after examining it, consigned it to New Harbor. Some other witnesses were examined including the Sub-Collector at Whitehouse, and the case was then postponed until this afternoon at 3.30 o'clock.

## Sealing Ships Sail.

THE COMMODORE LEADS.

The ships prosecuting the 1921 sealfishery, left port about 8.15 a.m. to-day. The vanguard was led by Capt. A. Kean, in the Terra Nova, followed by Capt. Barbour in the Neptune. The Ranger, Seal, Diana, Sagona, Thetis and Eagle sailing in the order named. The Thetis would have gone 6th, but in getting away from the pier she fouled with the anchor of the schooner Madeline Constantine. The Diana was also delayed a few minutes in getting out of port in order to land Mr. Fred Williams, who had remained on board unimpaired that the ship was underway. He was landed in the ship's quarter boat. While the steamers were passing through the Narrows, some men on the South Battery gave them a send off with several volleys of musketry. Last year 1,583 men prosecuted the voyage, but this season the crews were reduced and the same number of ships took 1,257 men. The following are the ships of the 1921 fleet with tonnage and crews:
